## VERDICT SET ASIDE IN DAMAGE SUIT

New Trial as to Damages—Market Flooded With Vegetables—Held for Jury

(Special to The Dispatch.)—New Bern, N. C., June 29.—Of interest in this section is the announcement that Judge Stacy, holding court in Carteret county last week, set aside the verdict of the jury in the case of Bloomberg vs. McIntosh, recently tried in Craven county Superior Court, as to the amount of damage due the plaintiff. The jury decided that Harold Bloomberg was entitled to 1,500 for injuries sustained when he was run down by an automobile driven by Mr. W. A. McIntosh, several months ago. Judge Stacy thought that the case needed a new trial on this feature of the verdict and ordered that such be held.

Riggins & Co., the Woodland Company, Carteret Fish Company, Star Fish Company, Pinner Brothers, the Independent Fish Company, Telson & Smith, and Joseph Dixon & Sons, has been formed and is planning to organize a company known as the Peoples' Ice Company, who will erect and operate a modern ice plant. The plant is to be erected at once and will be in operation by the fall. It will have a capacity of more than 20 tons of ice each day and, in addition to furnishing the ice used by the fish dealers mentioned above, will also furnish the public.

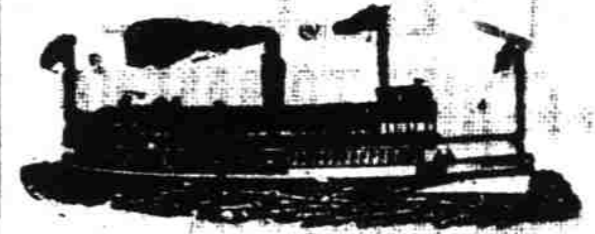
