Boston, Aug. 3.—On the third anniversary of the ruthless invasion of their country by the Germans, the members of the royal Belgian mission, headed by Baron Moncheur, arrived in Boston today and were given a welcome that rivaled in cordiality and enthusiasm the receptions recently accorded here to the French and Italian missions. Visits to Harvard University, Boston College, the Museum of Fine Arts and the Public Library were included in the afternoon program, with a public reception in Fancuil Hall and a patriotic demonstration on Boston Common planned for this evening.
