WILMORE SUNK BY GERMAN U-BOAT

American Armed Steamer of 5,399 Tons Sent to the Bottom.

London, Sept. 14.—The American ship Wilmore was sunk by a German submarine on September 12, according to an announcement made today by the British admiralty.

War Supplies for France. New York, Sept. 14.—The Wilmore was a steamer of 5,399 tons gross register, built in 1914 at Quincy, Mass., and was formerly known as the Atlantic.

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FRENCH PRISONERS AND ARE DEMENTED

Paris, Aug. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—A train of 201 French officers and men arrived in Lyons recently—prisoners repatriated from Germany.

One, a typical example, was a second lieutenant, apparently 22 or 23 years old. He was calm and quiet, but unable to reply to a question.

These unfortunates have been interned at Lyons, and their photographs are to be circulated throughout the country in the hope of identifying them, so that those who no doubt have long mourned them as lost forever, may perhaps be able to win them back from living tombs.

LUXBURG DODGED WAITING CROWDS

German Minister to Argentina is Persona Non Grata to People.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 14.—Count von Luxburg, the German minister whose passports were sent to the Argentine legation Wednesday by the Argentine government because of objectionable messages to Berlin through the Swedish foreign office had rendered him persona non grata, dodged threatening crowds which were waiting him on his arrival at Buenos Aires from the interior yesterday.

The chief of police was on hand with his automobile at San Martin, together with a large guard of secret service men, and the count was conveyed to his home in the chief's car.

"And these are my friends, the Argentines," he exclaimed to employees of the legation who met him. "What has happened?" he asked. "I know absolutely nothing. What has transpired?"

The count, however, although shown the Washington messages of last Saturday exposing his suggestion that Argentine ships be sunk "without leaving a trace," and his aspersion upon the acting minister of foreign affairs of Argentina, ignored an invitation to deny their authenticity.

DUPLIN IS STRONG FOR CONSERVATION

(Special to The Dispatch.) Warsaw, Sept. 14.—Miss Lucy Cobb, county home demonstration agent, reports the women of Duplin, both in the towns and rural districts, as responding nobly to the call for conservation.

As the county began late doing organized work along these lines, few young girls undertook canning as regular canning club members, but Miss Cobb reports these as assisting their mothers, and when another canning season begins, their experience will be of great benefit to them.

Throughout the county, the women, who are heads of households have let nothing go to waste, and their pantries resemble storehouses with their rows of jars of vari-colored fruits and vegetables in glass jars, flanked by tin cans of the same products, all put up by the 4-H brand.

Because this is the first year the county has been organized for the work, it will not exhibit as a county at the State fair, but there will be individual exhibits there, and also local exhibits, when citizens may see what splendid work the women of the county have done.

Miss Cobb expects shortly to begin poultry work among the boys and girls of the county, and other phases of domestic science will follow the canning work.

Mr. Mittie Henly, assistant State agent, is expected to be with Miss Cobb during the latter part of the month. Mr. W. C. Crosby, executive secretary State bureau of community service, has also promised to visit Duplin shortly.
