## NEW YORK COTTON.

New York, Oct. 5.—The low temperatures reported in the Northwest part of the country, appeared to cause a good deal of nervousness in the cotton market during today's early trading. The market opened steady at a decline of 10 points on October, but generally 1 to 3 points higher with the active months selling about 20 to 34 points above last night's closing figures during the early trading. Spot house brokers were buyers on the advance to 26.61 for December and 25.41 for January, while there was covering by some of yesterday's sellers for reaction and a moderate scattering demand.

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**CONGRESS SETS A NEW HIGH RECORD**

Appropriations and Contract Authorizations Total \$21,390,730,940

(By Associated Press) Washington, Oct. 5.—Chairman Martin of the Senate Appropriations Committee, in the review of the achievements of this session of Congress, and of appropriations and contract authorizations for the fiscal year 1918 issued today, says the session breaks all records and has been marked "by a greater volume of legislation and the enactment of measures of more momentous import than have ever been considered in any similar period in the parliamentary history of the country."

Total appropriations aggregate \$16,901,966,815, which with the total appropriations for the second session of the Sixty-fourth Congress, and the total contract authorizations for the present fiscal year, makes a grand total of \$21,390,730,940 in appropriations and contract authorizations for the present fiscal year.
