**A BIG JOB FEEDING THE NATIONAL ARMY**

Washington, D. C., Oct. 8.—Approximately 2,500 carloads of food and other necessities are being delivered daily by the railroads at the cantonments where the New Naval Army and the National Guard are being trained for service abroad, according to reports just received by the Railroads' War Board.

Accurate figures as to the extent to which the supplying of food and necessities for the soldiers at the training camps will intensify the transportation problem will not be available until all of the camps have received their full quota of men.

The task which the railroads have been asked to perform, however, is a difficult one. It involves the supplying of all the necessities of life for sixteen non-productive cities of a population of 10,000 each and fifty-six smaller cities ranging in population from 300 to 3,000.

Altogether more than a million men gathered at the various cantonments must have their daily necessities brought to them by the railroads. As it takes at least five pounds of food per day for each soldier in addition to the clothing, fuel and other supplies that are constantly needed, the railroads have their work cut out for them.

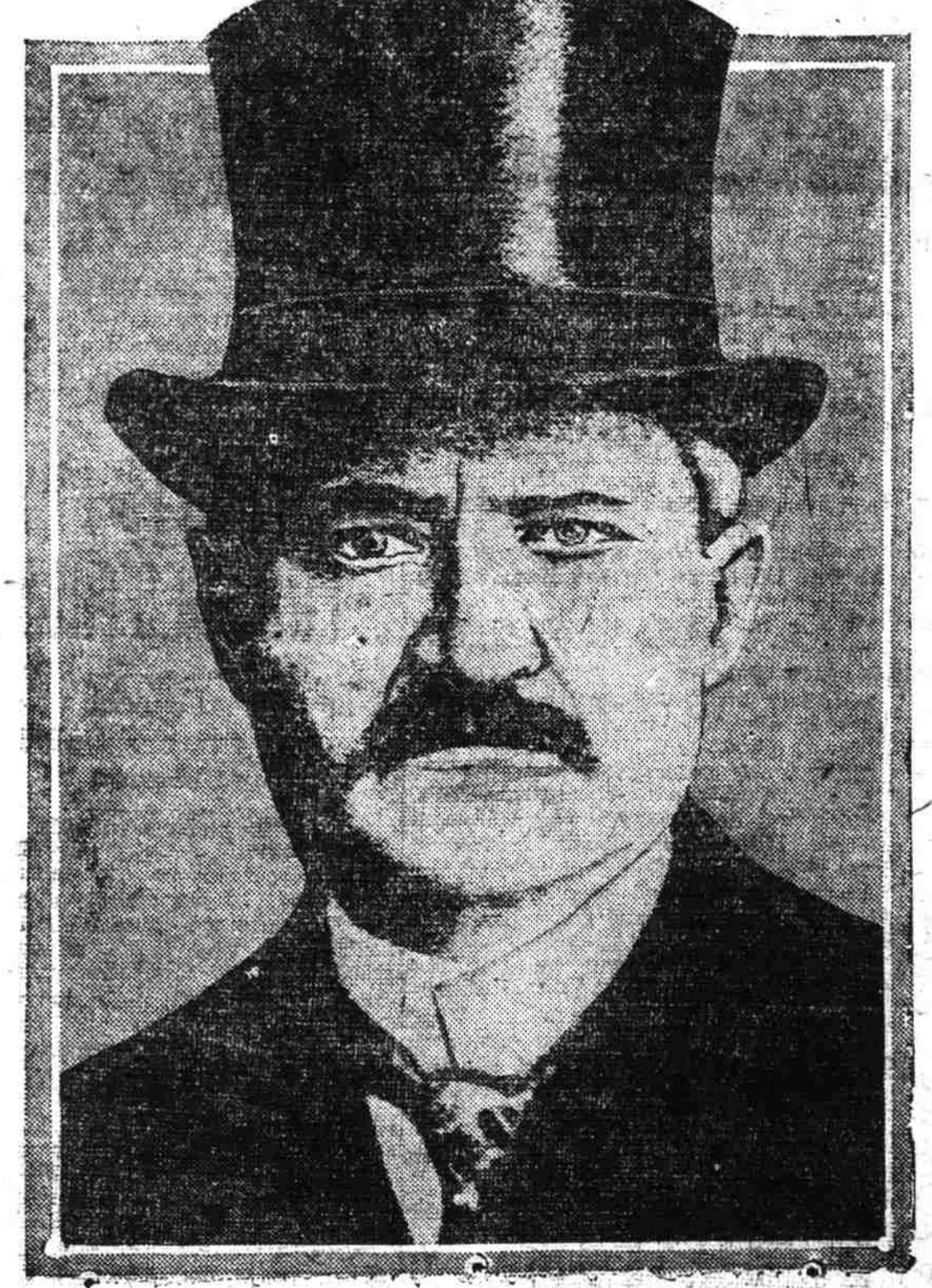
