FORMER WILMINGTON MAN IN TROUBLE

(Special to The Dispatch.) Whiteville, N. C., Oct. 10.—William H. Baxley, prominent in insurance circles, formerly having headquarters here, where he is well known, was tried here Monday before Judge Maulsbury on a charge of abandonment and non-support. He was convicted and sentenced to 18 months on the roads. However, prayer for judgment was continued until October 15, and provided he is successful in raising \$1,000 which will be turned over to his wife and children, the judgment will be suspended.

Baxley has been in the insurance business for many years, having represented a number of the large insurance companies in the capacity of general and district agent. He was for a number of years located here as district agent for several counties. He has had responsible positions with other companies, having headquarters in Wilmington, N. C., Atlanta, Ga., Jacksonville, Fla., and Petersburg, Va.

He left Wilmington the first of this year, and has been located in Jacksonville, Fla., with headquarters in that city, until about two months ago, when a warrant was sent to the authorities there for his arrest. He was arrested and brought to Columbus, where his family resided and lodged in jail in default of \$750 bond. Baxley is said to have left his family, a wife and two little girls, in Wilmington, N. C., and his wife not being provided with the proper financial aid from him was forced to return to her home at Hallsboro last February, and she has not received any support from him since, it is alleged. Mrs. Baxley is a sister of County Treasurer W. H. Hickman, and is highly respected by everyone who knows her.
