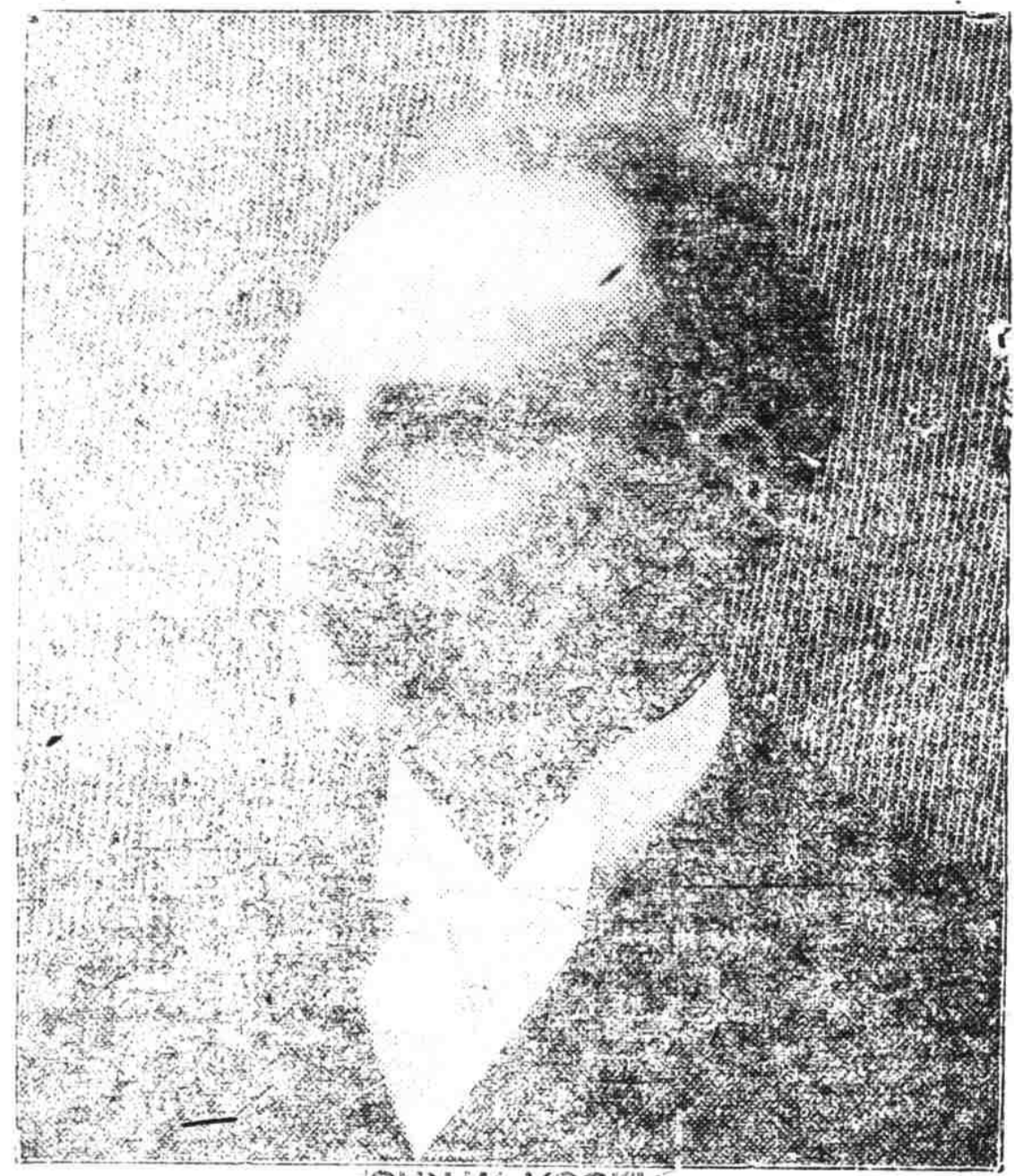

THE KAISER AFRAID OF AN AIR RAID

Amsterdam, Oct. 31.—According to the members of his personal suite, the Kaiser is always greatly affected by the character of the news he receives. If it is bad he is often profoundly depressed by it, if it is good he is wildly overjoyed. No news since the entry of the United States into the war has had a more depressing effect on him, it is said, than the reports coming from America that have hinted at the preparation of a great air fleet by the United States, a fleet of aircraft far greater and more formidable than any the other nations has put into the war.

It is a well known fact that the Kaiser has a great horror of being caught in an air raid. This is a besetting fear with him, when at any place that is in the least likely to be bombed by allied airmen. When the Kaiser was at Karlsruhe last year an alarm was raised that a large number of hostile aeroplanes were approaching. The Kaiser and his suite left the town at once, and motored to another place 120 miles distant. Once the Kaiser remarked to one of his personal attendants, "I cannot imagine a more horrible death than to be killed in a house when bombed by airmen." And yet the great "War Lord" has frequently expressed the wish to witness the bombardment of London or Paris by his airmen.
