PLAN TO CELEBRATE **EVARTS' CENTENARY**

Former Noted Lawyer and Statesman Was Born February 6, 1818

New York, Jan. 29.-Plans are under discussion for a suitable observance next month of the centenary of William H. Evarts, the Jamous statesman and lawyer, who was born February * 6, 1918. The celebration will likely take the form of a public meeting to be held under the auspices of the New York Bar Association, of which Mr. Evarts was for many years a foremost leader.

William H. Evarts played an important part in the history of his country. He won distinction as jurist, as fice of Registrar of Deeds of New an orator and as a statesman. In many important crises he, helped to shape the policy of the nation, and when he sought retirement, bowed under the burden of years, his counsels respectfully solicit your support. were still eagerly sought by leaders in every field of activity. His career at the bar was an almost unbroken series of splendid triumphs, and caused him to be twice selected for cabinet offices. He served as attorneygeneral under President Johnson and as secretary of state in the Hayes administration. He represented New York in the United States senate in 1885 and remained a potent factor in
