Time for Registration.

The Attorney General of the United States has fixed the time for registration of German alien enemies as the 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th days of February, 1918, inclusive, from 6 a. m. to 8 p. m., on each of said days. All German aliens are required, under heavy penalties, to present themselves for registration to the registrars in their localities, and to register themselves in accordance with the requirements of law. Places of Registration.

Registration shall be made by affidavit of the alien enemy required to register, to be executed in triplicate, accompanied by four unmounted photographs of the registrant not larger than 3x3 inches in size, on thin paper with a light background. Each photograph must be signed by the applicant across the face thereof so as not to ebscure the features. if the applicant is able to write. which signature must be made in the presence of the registrar. Each alion enemy required to register shall be required to register his finger prints. 2. A registration card will be issued by the registrar and delivered to the registrant.
