SHIP AND TEN OF CREW PERISHED. New York, Feb. 15.—Ten men of the crew of the British steamship DeLarrinaga of nearly 5,000 tons, perished on mid-ocean on February 8 when the vessel foundered. A cargo of grain bound for France went down with the ship.

The Larrinaga's captain, E. Williams, his chief officer R. S. Marn and his second officer and a gunner and six sailors sacrificed their lives—the small boats were not large enough to hold all on board.
