

LENROOT IS STILL LEADING THOMPSON

Milwaukee, Wis., March 20.—Outstanding features of yesterday's loyalty primary were a five-fold increase in the Socialist vote, the overwhelming victory of Joseph E. Davies, for the Democratic Senatorial nomination and the close race between Irvina L. Lenroot, the loyalist candidate, and James Thompson, who carried the banner of the LaFollette Republicans in the senatorial race of that party. Lenroot supporters maintained that what advantage there was on returns up to 11 o'clock today rested with Lenroot. With 14 counties missing, scattered reports from 57 gave Lenroot 56,696 and Thompson 54,763. The missing counties and precincts are so situated as to make an accurate forecast impossible, although it appeared that Lenroot's home district, which is always slow to report, would give him a majority sufficient to overcome that of Thompson in the city and county of Milwaukee. It may be days before the deciding votes are in from the backwoods.

HEAVIES ARE BUSY AT LAKE GARDA

Rome, March 20.—"West of Lake Garda," says today's war office report, "there occurred frequently harassing fire by the opposing artillery. From Lake Garda to Montello there were desultory artillery actions. Along the Piave exploring parties exchanged rifle fire across the river and patrol encounter took place. Our artillery carried out effective burst of fire against hostile positions on the left bank of the river between Noventa and Grisoners. "Our aviators set fire to two enemy captive balloons at Conegliano and Col Mirano. Two hostile airplanes were brought down, one by French aviators at San Giacomo Di Veglia and the other by British aviators on the Asiago plateau."

"THE BEAST OF BERLIN."

"THANK God that a picture company has at last had the nerve to come out and call the Kaiser, the Beast of Berlin." Thus thundered Burr MacIntosh at the opening of Rupert Julian's masterpiece, "The Kaiser, the Beast of Berlin," in New York City, as he jumped up on the stage of the Broadway Theatre in an exuberance of overwelling enthusiasm. Shaking his fist at the screen whence Julian's wonderful impersonation of America's arch enemy had just faded, MacIntosh hurled defiance at the Prussian and declared that only our sickly half-heartedness had prevented our having the Kaiser at this moment where Rupert Julian consigned him in the film. For the picture which Renowned Pictures Corp. has just sprung on a waiting public not only gives a graphic insight into the private life and personal characteristics of the vainest and cruelest man on earth, but settles the war and the Kaiser, too, to the entire satisfaction of every one who is not profiting by his depravity, moral and physical.

Rupert Julian's studied physical likeness to the mad dog of Europe was a startling and clever piece of work, but the way in which the story of the Kaiser's intrigues and determination to take Europe by surprise is intertwined with a fictitious story centering around a blacksmith of Louvain is still more clever. For the picture never becomes a war picture in the accepted sense. There are no battles, no slaughter, no hospitals. Yet all those are definitely implied by the intense struggle of the little group of stricken Belgians and commandants of the imperious court of the Hohenzollerns.

But "The Beast of Berlin" has just started a cycle of anti-Kaiser films. Ex-Ambassador Gerard's "My Four Years in Germany" is a splendid contribution to the Anti-Prussian fight which this country must wage within her own borders. And there is another skill to come called "Berlin via America," written by Elsie van Name and produced by Francis Ford, a



former director for the Universal Company. Ford has organized a company of his own called Fordart Films and after finishing his patriotic film he will produce a five-reel feature, "A Man of Today," and a fifteen episode serial to be called "The Silent Mystery." Ford has been in the picture business for ten years and he made Universal's first serial, "Lucille Love."
