Vienna, March 21.—(British Admiralty per Wireless Press)—Austro-Hungarian artillery has taken part in the fight against the English and French on the Western front, it is announced in today's war office statement.

Teutons Capture Ukraine Town.

Berlin, March 21 (via London).—Kherson, in the Ukraine (92 miles northeast of Odessa near the mouth of the Dnieper) has been captured by the Teutonic forces, today's army headquarters, report announces.

Did Not Inspire Letter.

Washington, March 21.—A letter to the Cudahy Packing Company written by E. Dana Burand, at Chicago, January 18 directing that the price of meat to feeders to be kept down, was written without the authority of J. P. Cotton, head of the meat division of the Food Administration. Mr. Cotton today, told the Senate Agriculture Committee. Mr. Cotton said it had been his endeavor to pay a fair price to cattle feeders.

Bavarian Troops Advance.

Berlin, March 21, via London.—Bavarian troops over ran the first enemy line, southwest of Ornes on the Verdun front, yesterday and advanced as far as the Brule ravine, capturing 240 men, army headquarters announced today.

Railroad Bill Signed.

Washington, March 21.—President Wilson today signed the bill bringing railroads under government operation and control until 21 months after the end of the war.

General Christmas Named.

Washington, March 21.—General Lee Christmas, the noted Central American revolutionist and soldier of fortune, has been engaged by President Estrada Cabrera, of Guatemala, to take charge of the work of restoration in Guatemala as chief of sanitation and order. Guatemala City was shaken into ruins a few weeks ago by an earthquake.

Another Spanish Premier.

Madrid, March 21.—Antonio Maura, former premier and conservative leader, has been instructed by King Alfonso to form a cabinet.

Professor Nearing Indicted.

New York, March 21.—Prof. Scott Nearing, formerly of the University of Pennsylvania, and of Toledo University, was today indicted by the Federal grand jury on the charge of violating the espionage act. The American Socialist Society with which he is connected, was indicted on the same charge, both being accused of distributing a pamphlet entitled "The Great Madness."

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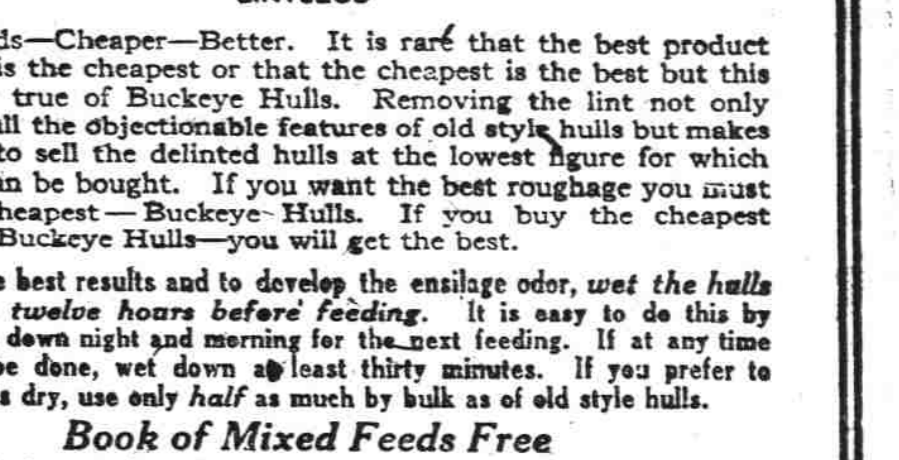
