## COLONEL HODGES IS GIVEN BRITISH ORDER

American Headquarters on the British Front, Wednesday, May 22.—Col. J. N. Hodges, of the American engineer corps, has been awarded the British distinguished service order in recognition of his services during the period from March 27 to April 3.

Colonel Hodges is one of the first American officers to receive the D. S. O. From March 2 to April 3 was the period during which the British were stemming the tide of the German offensive begun on March 21. The latest published United States army list gives John N. Hodges as a captain in the first engineers.

**The Letting Loose of Office.**

Charles E. Abernethy, who is candidate for the democratic nomination for congress from the third district, has been holding the job of solicitor for the fifth judicial district. He did not consider it good form for a man to hold to one office while running for another and so Mr. Abernethy has resigned as solicitor, banking all on winning the nomination. His principal opponent—Congressman Hood having been disposed of by bad health—Col. W. T. Dortch, of Goldsboro, is United States marshal for the eastern district, and The Wilmington Dispatch is calling upon him to follow the example of Abernethy. It is a question if the law applies to candidates for nomination. If Mr. Dortch were nominated it would undoubtedly become him to resign the marshalship.

## WARSAW WILL ENTERTAIN SELECTS SUNDAY NIGHT

Red Cross Rally Held and Liberty Loan Flag Is Presented

(Special to The Dispatch.)

Warsaw, N. C., May 24.—D. H. Wallace, one of the county's most prominent citizens, died at his home in Kenansville last Saturday. At the time of his death he was clerk of court for Duplin county, which office he had held continuously for 20 years. The deceased, who was widely known and well liked, was about 60 years of age. He is survived by his widow, who before marriage was Miss Ellsworth, and three children, Mrs. McGowan, of Wallace; Messrs. Fitzhugh and William Wallace, of Kenansville, in addition to two brothers, Messrs. Bland and Joe F. Wallace, of this county. The remains were carried to Wallace Sunday afternoon, and interment was made in the family burial plot.

Preparations are being made for the entertainment of 121 selectmen of this county in the homes of Warsaw next Sunday night. The money allowed by the government for their board and lodging will be turned over to the local branch of the county Red Cross chapter. The soldiers will entrain Monday morning for Camp Jackson, this being the largest number to leave the county at one time. Each will be given well equipped comfort kits.

## MOUNT OLIVE HAS GONE OVER QUOTA

(Special to The Dispatch.)

Mount Olive, May 24.—Well "over the top" is Mount Olive's happy record in the second Red Cross war fund. The town's quota was \$2,000, but when the week was only half gone the subscriptions had already totaled \$2,500, with indications pointing to a total of at least \$3,000. And no small part of the credit for this is due the colored people of the town, who have worked nobly in the interest of the cause and contributed very liberally.

By far the heaviest draft upon the manhood of this territory for military service so far is to be made to meet the requirements of the call for men to entrain during the five-day period beginning May 25. From the town and surrounding territory something like 30 or 40 young men will respond to their country's call during that period, taking practically all class A men.

An enthusiastic Red Cross rally was held here Tuesday night, when Warsaw more than doubled her quota for the second Red Cross war fund. Sums secured by the various teams, who had been at work for two days, with subscriptions taken at the meeting aggregated \$553.50, with a fair chance of going over \$1,000 before the drive is completed. The honor flag won by Warsaw in the third liberty loan campaign, when she over-subscribed her allotment, was presented, the presentation being made by Rev. K. W. Cawthon, and the speech of acceptance by R. D. Johnson, who passed the flag to Prof. E. K. Creel, who received it for the school. J. H. Newberry had charge of the exercises, which were held in front of the post-office building.

The few days fair weather this week has come as a godsend to farmers, who were becoming thoroughly discouraged at the continued rains, which not only damaged their crops by causing excessive moisture in the ground, but also prevented the necessary work to be done and making it hard to get rid of grass.

1,752 Persons Executed. London, May 24.—Under the white guard and German regime in Finland 1,752 persons were executed up to May 1, according to a Finnish socialist who has escaped to Sweden and whose interview with the Folks Dagblad is transmitted from Copenhagen by the Exchange Telegraph company.

U. S. Mission Arrives. Cortu, Wednesday, May 22.—An American mission which has been sent to assist the Serbians, arrived here today on the way to Saloniki. It is headed by Major Francis Jager, of the Red Cross.
