study world who are to take their observations in Denver or its immediate vicinity are Edwin B. Frost, d:rector of the Yerkes observatory and professor of astrophysics at the University of Chicago; Dr. Robert Trumpler, of Allegheny observatory: W. H. Garret, professor of mathematics and astronomy at Baker university; Arthur B. Turner, professor of mathematics at the University of the City of New York, and Prof. Biefield, of Denison university.

It will be the first time in many years that the occulation has passed over regions easily accessible. Most phenomena of the kind in recent years have been observable only in remote sections of the globe. On these occasions it has been impossible to transport the best instruments to the favorable points of observation, but tomorrow more different kinds of strange things are to be pointed at old Sol than ever before in the history of that gentleman.

One of the greatest astral telescopes in the country is located in this city. This instrument is 26 feet long. with a 20-inch aperature. It is located at the University of Denver, where the observations will be conducted under the direction of Dr. Herbert A. Howe, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and professor of astronomy. .
