## TOTAL ECLIPSE OF SUN TAKES PLACE SATURDAY

### Scientists Will Line Belt of Totality— Begins at 4:12 P. M.

Denver, Colo., June 7.—Astronomers, physicists, photographers and scientists of all branches are literally teeming along the belt of totality of tomorrow's eclipse of the sun. The majority of the scientists have chosen Colorado for their observations because of the clearness of the atmosphere and the time at which the eclipse will be on in the intermountain region. The beginning of the eclipse will be apparent in Denver at 4:12 p. m. mountain time. Full daylight will have returned at 6:20 p. m.

Among those in the astronomic study who are to take their observations in Denver or its immediate vicinity are Edwin B. Frost, director of the Yerkes observatory and professor of astrophysics at the University of Chicago; Dr. Robert Trumpler, of Allegheny observatory; W. H. Garret, professor of mathematics and astronomy at Baker university; Arthur B. Turner, professor of mathematics at the University of the City of New York; and Prof. Biefield, of Denison university.

It will be the first time in many years that the occultation has passed over regions easily accessible. Most phenomena of the kind in recent years have been observable only in remote sections of the globe. On these occasions it has been impossible to transport the best instruments to the favorable points of observation, but tomorrow more different kinds of strange things are to be pointed at old Sol than ever before in the history of that gentleman.

One of the greatest astral telescopes in the country is located in this city. This instrument is 26 feet long, with a 20-inch aperture. It is located at the University of Denver, where the observations will be conducted under the direction of Dr. Herbert A. Howe, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and professor of astronomy.

## FEAR OF UPRISING OF INDIANS IS DISPELLED

### Forced to Buy Wheat Flour by Card System and Army Draft Causes

Henryetta, Okla., June 7.—Fear of a possible uprising among Indians and negroes and those of mixed Indian and African blood in the Old Hickory stamping grounds was dispelled when the Henryetta company of home guards, led by Lieut. Ray, returned here with word that the malcontents had promised to disperse their bands and would not attempt any trouble.

Dissatisfaction over the army draft, the fact that they were forced to buy wheat flour on the card system and that they were made to support various war causes, were said to be the reasons for the discontent among the inhabitants of the region made famous by the Crazy Snake rebellion of 1908.

Reports Wednesday that three white farmers had been slain could not be confirmed today, and members of the home guard company and officers who went to the scene were unable to learn more definitely of the reported killings.

The Old Hickory stamping grounds, which was the scene of the Crazy Snake uprising 10 years ago, is in a most isolated locality. For some time the authorities say there have been
