

# TROLLEY STRIKE GOES ON

LITTLE DISORDER AND FEW ARRESTS—POLICE GUARD THE CARS.

## THE STRIKERS CLAIM THAT THEY WILL WIN

But The Road Officials Tell Another Story—Full Protection Offered Returning Employees.

Brooklyn, N. Y., July 17.—Cars are running to-day at infrequent intervals on the lines operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Co. on a strike. However decidedly unsettled the condition of affairs may be, the employees are seemingly satisfied with their efforts so far.

Railroad officials assert that they will have all lines running on schedule time within a short period.

There have been no acts of violence, the men continuing their fight within the most stringent limits of the law.

There were two arrests made early to-day, but the charges were merely for disorderly conduct, the police taking the men into custody simply on suspicion that they might have been concerned in an alleged attempted attack on a car near the corner of Vanderbilt avenue and Prospect Place.

Railroad officials made good use of conductors and motormen on the trolley lines not included in the strike. These were swung about on lines held up, so that this morning cars are moving on every line.

Two policemen guard every car, except on the Nassau line, on which there are three policemen to every car.

The elevated roads are running on their usual schedule time, and Brooklynites are not seriously delayed in reaching work.

Generally speaking, the cars on all congested lines, after six this morning, are running about one-sixth as frequently as their regular schedule.

President Rossiter said this morning that some fifty men who went out had reported for work to-day and were taken back.

### The Cleveland Strike.

Cleveland, July 17.—The conductors and motormen of the big consolidated street railway system, on strike last month, went out again this morning. Eight hundred are affected. They say the company did not live up to its agreement.

### The New York Troubles.

New York, July 17.—Not a car ran to Coney Island today, either on the Rapid Transit or Nassau lines. The only connection between the island and the city was by steamboat and Smith street and Culver routes. These were greatly crowded in spite of the fact that they are usually little patronized by the Coney Island people. There was no disorder, the police detailed on the Coney Island route having little to do.

### Metropolitan Traction In Trouble.

New York, July 17.—A member of the State Board of Arbitration and Mediation said to-day that he had been advised that unless the Metropolitan Traction Company acceded to the demands of the motormen on its system, a strike would be ordered. At the meeting of the board this morning President Vreeland, of the Metropolitan road, failed to be present, on account of the sickness of his wife.

### Men Bound to Win.

Brooklyn, July 17.—This afternoon President Rossiter said there is no strike district.

Master workman Pines said that a thousand more men are out to-day than yesterday. The men have the upper hand and are bound to win.

### Three Hundred New Men.

Philadelphia, July 17.—The agents of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit to-day engaged three hundred experienced

motormen and conductors to take the places of the strikers.

### Reports Are Encouraging.

Brooklyn, July 17.—The reports from various depots are encouraging. Every line is being operated. Some of the Nassau lines are making slow headway, but in every case the cars bring additional employees. The superintendents are instructed to afford full protection to returning employees.

## A REIGN OF TERROR BEGUN

FOLLOWS ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE MILAN. HUNDREDS IN DUNGEONS.

## KING ALEXANDER BACKS THE MOVEMENT

Best Patriots in Serbia In Danger—Will Be Executed Unless the Powers Interpose.

Moscow, July 14.—The latest despatches, which escaped the vigilance of the censor at Belgrade, tell of a reign of terror following the recent attempt to assassinate ex-King Milan, of Serbia.

Milan has seized upon this attempt of the mad Bavarian to kill him as a pretext and occasion of putting his most influential and numerous enemies out of the way. He receives the backing of his son, King Alexander, and it is his purpose to re-enact the atrocities of the Stambouloff regime.

Milan is pursuing and putting to death the best patriots of Serbia. Hundreds are thrown into dungeons, and death sentences are pronounced without the formality of trial. These sentences will speedily be executed unless the powers interpose between Milan and his victims.

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### DEWEY'S RECEPTIONS QUIET.

British Are Making No Stir Over Him—His Visit to Malta.

London, July 15.—According to information obtained from British naval sources, Admiral Dewey's reception at various British stations was no more cordial and in no way different from that accorded to the Admirals of other fleets.

Admiral Dewey's visit to Malta is likely to be very quiet. The Governor is in deep mourning on account of the death of his wife.

The British fleet left Malta last Sunday on its summer cruise, and half of the officers of the garrison and many of the English residents, are absent, the former on furloughs, the latter in Great Britain or traveling on the continent.

### THE JUNTA TO MOVE.

Filipinos are Being Watched Too Closely—They Move Near Borneo.

Manilla, July 15.—The transport Warren will sail tomorrow with the Colorado regiment on board. It is reported that the Filipino Junta will be moved from Hong Kong to the island of Labuan, a British colony, six miles from the coast of Borneo, as American officials have watched the members of the Junta so close that the latter found it impossible to supply arms to the insurgents.

### Thirteen Knots An Hour.

Southampton, July 17.—In her trial on Saturday the Shamrock, running with the wind, did thirteen knots an hour. Her speed was tested by those aboard the steam yacht Erin which accompanied her.

## THE GLORIOUS FOURTH IN FAR OFF HONOLULU

A German Captain and Der Kaiser's Flag—A Riot Results—Flag and Captain Trampled On.

Victoria, B. C., July 14.—The Honolulu steamer brings tidings that the 4th of July was celebrated with great eclat in Honolulu, there being orations, poems, speeches and songs.

One untoward event was occasioned by a German, Captain Klemme, who had decorated his house with the stars and stripes, but high above all these floated a German flag. This aroused much comment and a personal enemy of Captain Klemme, by exaggerating the importance of the incident and appealing to the overflowing enthusiasm of the members of the National Guard and soldiers of the transport Sheridan precipitated a riot. An attempt was made to tear down the flag.

In the afternoon when all danger of trouble was thought to be over the assault was renewed and the flag was hauled down and trampled upon. Klemme was made a prisoner and held for awhile.

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### NOT IN IT.

American Tobacco Company is Not Backing the Warehouse Combine.

Durham, N. C., July 14.—The printed statement from the American Tobacco Company that the concern has nothing whatever to do with the warehouse trust, directly or indirectly, has had a tendency to ease-up matters to some extent since the visit of the warehouse trust man to Durham. Old tobacco men said to-day that the warehouse trust would amount to nothing unless supported by the American Company. For, they say, the farmers would support anti-trust warehouses in preference to the others, and it would not require long to close down the combination. Contracts for the erection of new houses would be let at once in case the other deal went through.

Several well-to do tobacco planters were in the city to-day and announced their readiness to support the anti-trust warehouses, even to taking large stock in them.

Three Men Organize a Lynching Bee—They Meet a Vigorous Resistance.

Washington, July 15.—Three men cheered on by a crowd of several hundred who had gathered to see the fun, made an attempt to storm Alandria jail early this morning in order to lynch William Dodson, an aged negro. The jailer, his wife and three friends, delivered a shower of bullets upon the attacking trio. The lyncher's wrath was finally cooled, and no further attempt made to reach Dodson during the night.

Dodson was arrested on the charge of assaulting eight-year old Viola Elliott last Tuesday night. Dodson was terribly frightened and prayed continually for his life. He is about eighty years old and was born a slave.

### MUZZLING THE PRESS.

The True Inwardness of Lack of War News. It is Being Suppressed.

Manila, July 17.—The press correspondents in the Philippines have united in a signed protest against the censorship of press despatches, which has prevented cabling to the United States anything except that news which reflected the official views of important events and conditions.

### A BANK WRECKED.

The Cashier Gets \$125,000 and Skips—Excitement at Perth Amboy.

New York, July 14.—Geo. M. Vandenbrant, the cashier of Middlesex National Bank at Perth Amboy, reported to have disappeared. He has not been seen since Saturday last. Bank officials examined the books and it is reported have discovered a shortage of \$125,000. The defalcation was kept quiet till this morning. The town is wild with excitement.

The first intimation that the citizens had of trouble was the bank opening for business as usual. When the depositors went to the bank they found the doors closed. In a few minutes a big crowd had gathered. A notice on the door stated that the national bank examiners had taken possession. The books of the South Amboy Savings Institution are also being examined.

Mr. H. E. C. Bryant, of the Charlotte Observer, who suffered an attack of appendicitis some time ago, but was improving and had gone to the State Hospital at Morganton to recuperate, was taken seriously ill Tuesday with a second attack. He was much improved Wednesday but an operation will be performed as soon as Mr. Bryant can return to Charlotte.

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
