En route to Morong the Americans met flocks of Philippinos under flags of truce, many of them young men with the bearing of soldiers. Many discarded uniforms were found in the houses, apparently those of soldiers who had escaped by changing their costumes from "insurrecto" to "amigo," and walking boldly past the army, which had expected to erral them. Few were found about Morong. One member of the Washington regiment was killed and two were wounded in the encounter with the outposts General Lawton, on board a gunboat searching the coast for Major Truman, stopped at Binangonana, opposite Morong. The natives immediately ran up a flag of truce, and a delegation in canoes put off and greeted the Americans with the usual protestations of friendship.


