The average today was around thirty six cents. Our farmers are selling their tobacco too fast. They should get out their cotton during this fine weather and let their tobacco alone until later. This will enable the buyers with their short help to care for the weed as it comes in and while this will also help to sustain the price for the demand for tobacco is good.
