EXPRESS STRIKERS WENT BACK TO WORK

An interesting situation has developed in connection with the striking express men of Richmond which has been referred to in the Times during the past few days.

For the life of us we could not understand how the members of the Union could uphold two men who were guilty of the violation of the rules of the company and were utterly derelict in their duties.

The statement published by the manager of the company which was not refuted was to the effect that when the delegation from the employees came back to ask for the reinstatement of the men he explained to them the grievance of the company and asked for sufficient time to make an investigation and that if after an investigation showed the company at fault that it would make reparation and pay the men for their time. This did not satisfy the men at all who at once ordered the strike.

Desiring to ascertain the truth of this statement we interviewed one of the men on the road last night out of Richmond and he said that the charges were true and the men should not have gone out, but that he went out because the others did. The government told them to go back to work or quit for good and so they returned to work.

SALES OF TOBACCO

The price of tobacco is away up in the pictures while that of cotton is on the decline. No one can understand this, for it would seem there should be more demand for clothes to wear than for tobacco.

The sales for last month which we are not sure we have published are as follows: There were 3,676,875 pounds sold for \$1,210,006.24, at an average of 32.90. The sales for the season were 16,441,641 for \$5,594,663.42, at an average of 34.02.

GOOD PRICES

The sales of tobacco on the Wilson market today were estimated at around 500,000 pounds and the average was \$39.00.
