WINGATE FARMERS

BUSINESS UNION
(Marshville Home)

The organized farmers of Wingate community have followed the example of Lanes Creek and Trinity last spring and withdrawn from Alexander's political union. Wingate sent a delegate to Wilson. He listened, heard and saw enough at Wilson to make him enthusiastically in favor of sending no more campaign funds to promote the Alexander State political union. And after he made his report at a regular meeting of Wingate Local Union Saturday night, this organization, which consists of about fifty members, passed the following resolutions:

"Whereas, the State president, after bringing a cloud of shame in 1917 over the Farmers Union, has again secured his re-election through political manipulators, therefore be it resolved by Wingate Local Union,

1. That we organize ourselves into Wingate Farmers Business Union and retain for the present in our local organization all moneys derived from the payment of dues
2. That we express our willingness to federate with other independent unions or clubs and to support county or district unions if it shall be deemed desirable to maintain larger representative organizations.
