AN UNPOLISIED DIAMOND.
A remarkable diamond was exthe New York Academy of the New York Academy of Sci-
ences by Mr. George F. Kuntz. It was a compound or multiple number of twinvings. It is o the class termed "extreme dur ate" by the French. It had been cut into the general shape of a ridliant, and itu main face or ta ble was then placed on the pol-
