The Windsor Republicans met in precinct convention last Friday. They were called to order by Chairman Champ Pugh, who did all in his power to control the meeting in the interest of Ben Askew, but the Ex Coroner went down by a majority of fifteen. Seeing that his faction was routed, Ben Askew raised the war cry of a Comanche Indian, but Ben's rabbit foot had failed him. He moved for fifteen minutes time for speaking, and when his motion was lost he and his followers withdrew. The convention was organized by the election of Augustus Robbins Chairman, and W. H. Leath Secretary. The proceedings were entirely orderly and creditable—that is after Ben's crowd got out. The delegates selected to go to the County Convention were Limas Roulhac, Rhodes Bond and Lewis Bond, all reputable colored men. In fact no white men attended the convention. They will simply accept nominations. The body endorsed Reed, Cheatnam, Dockery and Roulhac.
