WHITE SUPREMACY CLUBS.

The following is the Preface of the Plan of Organization of These Clubs

Our State is the only community in the world with a majority of white voters where it is seriously proposed to take the control of public affairs of the State out of the hands of the white people and commit them to a political combination composed chiefly of negroes and dominated almost entirely by negro influence.

By the united effort of the good white people of the State, irrespective of party, in 1898, the State was rescued from negro rule and the amendment to the constitution to be voted upon by the people in August is submitted for the purpose of forever removing the danger of recurrence of negro ascendancy in the State.

The necessity for the continued cooperation of the white people of the State for self protection is shown by the fact that the party which so recently negroized the State, and which for this and its other short comings was hurled from power in 1898, is again asking the people to restore it to the control of the State, and actually indulged the hope that with the aid of 120,000 negro votes solidly cast for it, it may succeed in regaining control of the government.

The purpose of organization is declared to be so fully restored and to make permanent in North Carolina the supremacy of the white race; to promote individual effort in behalf of the party and its candidates on the part of the voters, and to bring the head of the organization in the counties and State more closely and easily in touch with our township organization and the individual party voter.

Article 3d of the plan provides: Neither oaths, grips, signs nor pass words shall be allowed, and meetings shall be open.

Any club may, if it so desires, adopt a badge, button, insignia or uniform.

The fifth section of the plan provides: Every white man who desires white government in North Carolina, and is willing to use every practicable and honorable means to restore and permanently establish white supremacy therein, and who proposes to support candidates pledged to effect that purpose, in the ensuing election shall be eligible to membership of the township club.

The fourteenth section of the plan provides: The clubs in their organized capacity, shall not seek to influence the nominations of candidates, nor to influence conventions. They will be confined to building up and promoting the interests of the party generally, and the election of candidates, after the same have been regularly nominated, and inculcating among the people the necessity of establishing and maintaining white supremacy, as the only hope for the preservation of our civilization.

The following is the concluding provision of the plan:

The clubs will be working bodies, not dress parade organization. Important work will be assigned to each member.

QUEER EPITAPHS

"I have made something of a study of epitaphs," explained Representative Boutell, of Chicago, in justification of the frequency with which he has recently adorned his Congressional speeches with samples of tombstone poetry.

"Beneath the monumental stones Lie all that's left of Susan Jones. Her name was Lord and was not Jones But Jones was used to rhyme with stones."

"My own theory about many of these ancient and amusing epitaphs," said Mr. Boutell, "is that they were composed and chiseled into the stone by somebody else than the immediate friends of the deceased. Some of them undoubtedly were written as a joke. I think it probable that the stone masons in those days of comparatively illiteracy were allowed to inscribe poetic lines to the memory of the dead, and that they often took unusual liberties in the range of expression."

Raleigh, N. C., March 1.—C. W. Battle, the colored postmaster of Battleboro, is in jail at Halifax for embezzling \$400 of money order funds and failure to make returns of post-office cash. The thefts are alleged to have been committed January 14. A white man named Stokes succeeded him as postmaster.

COTTON MILLS IN NORTH CAROLINA.

North Carolina fast becoming a Manufacturing State.

For the last ten years it has been evident to the casual observer that North Carolina is making rapid strides in industrial development. This has been especially true in the cotton manufacturing industry. For over fifty years North Carolina has had cotton mills, but to-day they are far more numerous than ever before.

As the farm lands are valued at only \$110,000,000, it will be readily seen that the cotton mill industry is second in importance only to the agricultural interests. If the rate of increase during the past year were to continue for ten years, the State could no longer be called an agricultural State.

Those who do not live in a mill community can from only a very slight idea of the good a cotton mill does. The Henrietta Mills, the largest in the State, with a capital of \$900,000, has 60,000 spindles, and looms in proportion. Every day they weave over 65,000 yards of cloth—enough to cover a road 2 1/2 feet wide for nearly eight miles.

NO UNIT RULE AND NO "STRUCTURING."

"Now, when the county convention meets the same modus operandi must be carried out. If the county is entitled to 24 votes in the State convention and it is shown that one of the candidates for governor, (or other State office) has one-half or two-thirds of the votes of the precinct, then he will receive in the State convention 12 or 16 votes of the county in question (as the case may be) and no more, unless by an unanimous vote the convention decides to the contrary."
