CONTAINING A FEW TRUTHS

Senator Butler Is Flooding The State With Copies of His Speech in Congress Against The Franchise Amendment To The Constitution.

It is astonishing how short the memory of the Republican leader is. Take for instance Revenue Collector Carl Duncan, who looks after Republican affairs in all Eastern North Carolina. He was speaking about the Legislature which is to be elected this year and offered to bet it would be Republican. No doubt he included Populists in his count, as the Republicans invariably speak of themselves and Populists jointly as "we."

What shortness of memory. Does anyone think for the nearest portion of a second that the Democrats in North Carolina and those who stood shoulder to shoulder with them in 1898 at the election have so soon forgotten the negro rule in this State in 1897-98? It is inconceivable that in one year any people so determined could ever think of returning to such a state of affairs. If Collector Duncan bets he will lose as he lost in 1898, if there are three things certain besides death and taxes in this year of grace, 1900, they are that the Democrats will carry the Legislature and elect their Congressional nominees and that the constitutional Amendment will be ratified by a majority more than gratifying.

Senator Butler is flooding the State with copies of his speech in Congress against the franchise amendment to the Constitution. This plea for negro supremacy is being sent out by Republicans under the Senator's frank. Collector Duncan, for example, is sending out some thousands of copies. Collector Duncan has a great admiration for the Senator; in fact he said a few days since he loved him. This tenderness is very beautiful. It has increased considerably since the winter and early spring of 1897.

Republican State Chairman Holton one of the bitterest of all the Republicans had some criticisms to make of Governor Russell's frank statement made at a banquet in Chicago in which the Republicans were arraigned for allowing themselves to be placed in antagonism to the Constitutional Amendment. The governor says more clearly than Holton the "hand writing on the wall." He knows what the white men of the State will do at the polls next August.

The Governor dismissed Holton's criticism with a few contemptuous words.

It is hardly probable that the session of the Legislature in June will last more than one week or that it will do things other than the particular thing for which it meets—that is to safeguard the election law and the franchise amendment. There will be no pressure to have it consider some other business—local in character.

This leads to the just criticism of much of the steadily increasing volume of business which is forced upon the Legislatures. At last one-third of it, perhaps even more, could easily be done by the Clerks of Superior Courts.

It is the talk among Republicans here that Judge Ewart cannot be confirmed and that Senator Pritchard will be judge. Some persons have named James E. Boyd to this connection, but well informed Republicans point out Pritchard as the man. The latter, like Senator Butler, knows that this term ends his senatorial life.

Populists are saying that there will be a revolt against Senator Butler and his determined effort to enforce their State Convention to array itself in opposition to the franchise amendment. They are telling Republicans as much. Senator Butler will be surprised at the dimensions of this revolt. He will find that he cannot make Populists get in line against white supremacy. They showed him this in 1898. This year they will illustrate it even more plainly.

The Republicans have had an idea that they were going to induce Attorney General Walser to declare himself against the Amendment. As he remarked to-day, they do not know him. He will take no such step, nor will he antagonize the Amendment. He was speaking to a Republican and a Democrat when the Republican made the statement that a certain Populist had said he would vote against the Amendment for fear he would be disfranchised. "Not at all," said the Attorney General, "it is impossible, provided he registers before 1908." This indicates an able Republican's legal view of the matter.

Branning's mill, a very large lumber plant situated at this place, was burned Sunday at 1 P. M. The mill was worth \$40,000. SYNDICATE IN PINE TIMBER.

THE BRANNING COMPANY IN IT

The deal that is the talk of the lumber interests of this section now is the formation of a syndicate by seven well known lumber mills to control the entire lumber business of North Carolina. The seven companies which will comprise this syndicate are the Atlantic Coast Lumber Company, of Georgetown, S. C., the Surry Lumber Company, The Branning Manufacturing Company, The Cape Fear Lumber, The Camp Manufacturing Company, the Tunis Lumber Company, of Norfolk, and the John D. Roper Lumber Company. Three of these mills are located here.

It is expected by the men interested in the combination that it will be able to control the entire lumber business of North Carolina. The seven companies are named, it is said, own about four billion feet of timber and control about six hundred miles of railroad. Their saw mill capacity is 1,500,000 feet a day, and they have large planning mills and box factories. Together they sell about 80 per cent of all the North Carolina pine sold, the total output being about six hundred million feet. Tangible assets of the seven companies are estimated at \$23,000,000, and it is proposed to capitalize them at \$28,000,000, upon which it is expected that dividends can be earned through the economies of consolidation.—Edenton Courier.

CRUISE FOR NAVAL MILITIA

The prairie having been assigned to duty for the annual drill and instruction of the Naval Militia organizations of the Atlantic and Gulf States, the Department has decided upon what it considers the most feasible

plan for giving each State having such an organization an equal amount of practical experience at sea.

The cruises this year will begin at New Orleans April 23 and, working gradually up the coast, will end with Boston in September.

The Maryland men are expected to be ready for their cruise the latter part of June, and within a few days the precise date will be fixed by the Department and Governor Smith notified. As the Department has no appropriation for such purposes, the State will be expected to bear the expense of subsistence of the organization while on board ship and to see that they are supplied with proper bedding.

Each organization will go to sea and remain for seven days, the first four of which will be devoted to instruction and man-of-war routine duties, with particular reference to simulating drill and subcaliber practice, the following two days to be devoted to actual target practice.

The watch duties of the vessel will be performed by the officers of the Naval Militia under the supervision of the regular officers stationed on board, and such watch officers will as far as practicable, be instructed in all that pertains to the handling, navigation and fighting of the vessel.

At the end of this tour of duty the commanding officer of the prairie will make a detailed report to the Department, in which he will state the qualification of the officers for the positions they hold and the fitness of the petty officers and enlisted men for naval services at sea.

Under the present circumstances and conditions of the service this is the only opportunity which can be afforded the Naval Militia of the coast States for sea service and practice drill during the present year. Ample time is afforded for preparation, and State organization must be fully prepared to embark at the time stated.

The young Southerners sought out Fitchett at once and compelled him to accompany them to the home of Mrs. Turk on Mansion street, where Miss O'Connell boards, to apologize. When they reached the boarding-house Fitchett was taken into Miss O'Connell's presence, and she accused him of having insulted her. "You are a liar!" exclaimed Fitchett, as the young woman fled from his presence. Lot and Miller seized Fitchett, who at first showed fight, saying, "You mind your own business, this is my affair."

When a woman is insulted in our company," said Lot, "men make it their affair, and since you have insulted this young woman in our presence, we make it our affair."

With this both Lot and Miller proceeded to punch Fitchett, while the other inmates of the house screamed in terror. They knocked Fitchett down, cuffed his ears and kicked him out of the room into the hall.

Miller and Lot were hailed before Recorder Morchauser in the Police Court charged by Fitchett with assault.

"What have you to say?" asked the Recorder. "We are guilty," promptly answered the students, "if you call it an offense to thrash a man who insults a woman. Down in our country we don't call that guilty, we call it chivalry. This man might have been killed in the South for such conduct."

"Is this young woman any relation of yours?" said the Recorder to Miller. "No, and it's lucky for Arthur Fitchett that she is not," was the hot reply.

"I admire your chivalry," said the Recorder, "but you cannot beat anybody here. The law is against that sort of thing. I fine you \$25 each."
