A COTTON MILL FOR WINDSOR.

There is no reason why this community should not take advantage of the present conditions and ride, in on the flood. To have faith in the future of Windsor is not to dream. The elements for a bright future are not wanting. Determination, well directed effort, and energy backed by money will put us on the road to wealth and influence.

Where there is no growth there is decay. The community that is not progressive must fall behind in the race of prosperity. Two things at least, are necessary for the prosperity of a community—natural conditions favoring enterprise, and a citizenship with sufficient public spirit and business foresight to take advantage of such conditions. Nothing it seems to me, would so largely contribute to the advancement to this community and promote a spirit of enterprise as a cotton mill. The raw material is at hand, labor is easily and cheaply to be had, the whole world is a market; and why should not the necessary capital be forth coming? Such an institution would undoubtedly stimulate the growth of the town; and almost every class our population in town and surrounding country would be benefited. Hundreds of young men and women who are now compelled to leave the country for work (a fact which should seriously command the attention of all) would find employment at home. This would mean the creation of a payroll, which in its turn, would mean the quickening of trade to our merchants—every one being entitled to his share. By the growth of the town, owners of real estate would see their property enhanced in value. Cotton would bring a better price, as much above the Norfolk market as it costs to carry it there, pay storage, sell it and bring it back to Windsor; and we all know what half cent a pound means for cotton. The permanent growth of the town would be followed by the establishment of a well equipped graded school, which would futher attract people here and become a great factor in our life.

This community must begin to take her place in the rapid development of the south. We should begin with a cotton mill, for, besides the fact of the stimulation it would give to futher enterprises, there is no reason why such an institution would not of itself be an immediately fine investment; since it is true, I am informed, that every well established cotton mill in North Carolina is realizing exceedingly handsome dividends. And the time for action is at hand. New countries have recently been opened to our products, and business actively all along the line is intense.
