### A FAMOUS GEORGIAN ON THE

NEGRO.

Sam Jones, the Georgia evangelist writes often for the Atlanta Journal which is probably the best evening paper in all the south. In his last article, of 26th inst, he says some pointed things as to "the negro losing ground." After reviewing his past in the south, and saying things amusing and sensible and harsh, he says

"For the better element and better class of negroes I have always had the profoundest sympathy and respect. I have more respect today for a decent negro than I have for a dirty white man. \* \*. The best nogroes know in Georgia today were never in a school hou e, and were born and raised to manhood and womanhood before they had the right to vote There is no place where an educated negro can find room to work in any southern state, unless it is as a teacher or as a preacher, or in the chaingang. Those are the only three places that are open to an educated negro \* The regro is to blame largely for this state of things, for if the negro had realized that the best whit people of the south were his friends and he had quit gonging with the liquor crowd and let Yankee-Doodle alone he would have been much bet ter off today. For the good negroes there is room in the hearts of the best southern people and they will be protected by law and employed and maintained.
