The Great Trust Evil. There are nearly four hundred combines or trusts in this country and their financial strength is appalling as well as their effect is oppressing-upon the common people of our country. We give below a list of thirty whose individual stock amounts to \$50,000,000 and over.

The thirty combinations above are credited with capital amounting to two and one-third billions of dollars. The entire general stock of money of all kinds in the United States, gold, silver notes and certificates, amounts to about \$2,700,000,000. So that if all the four hundred combines in the list should try to return their capitalizations into cash they would use up every penny of the nation's money and then have only about forty per cent of their demands. Indeed, the thirty corporations mentioned here would nearly use up all our cash. Of course, we know that business is transacted mostly on credit and this gives and entirely different view of the case, but the comparisons show the real financial hugeness of the modern combinations. It naturally follows that such a condition should become a political issue.—Ex. "Ye shades of the departed!" How, under the sun, any republic can long live or prosper with such a yoke upon its neck is beyond our imagination. We are glad America is a young republic and in her youth has strength, for were she among the older nations she could but totter and reel in carrying such a gigantic and oppressive burden. And there is no prospect of immediate relief—none whatever. The Republican party, tho, in its platform declares against trusts and combines, fosters and protects them by legislative enactments. More of them have been formed under McKinley's administrations than in all previous history and the end is not yet.

ness to all mankind, we ask our people to again consider the erection of some manufacturing industry in our midst. We have sufficient capital right here in our county-seat to establish a cotton factory, or any other sort of a factory, the equal of any in North Carolina.
