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SENATE CALLED ON TO IMPEACH JUDGES FURCHES AND DOUGLAS.

The House Reads a Committee to the Senate to Notify That Body of the Adoption of the Impeaching Resolution.

MR. FRANCIS D. WINSTON MAKES SPEECH OF NOTIFICATION.

The Article of Impeachment Are Being Prepared.

A DRAMATIC SCENE IN THE SENATE.

The Senate Will Now Prosecute Them. Four of the Attorneys For the Prosecution Selected.

The committee appointed by the House of Representatives to notify the Senate of the passage of the impeachment resolution, and demand that it organize a high court of impeachment for the trial of Justices Furches and Douglas, yesterday performed that duty.

This committee was composed of the following five members: Mr. WINSTON, of Bertie, chairman.

Mr. ARDREY, of Mecklenburg; Mr. ZACHARY, of Transylvania; Mr. BOUNTY, of Washington; Mr. CARLTON, of Duplin.

It was expected that they would wait upon the Senate at noon, to discharge this solemn duty, but by a resolution adopted soon after the House met, the hour was changed to 1:30 o'clock.

All the day the galleries and lobbies of the Senate had been crowded with people anxious to witness this unusual proceeding.

At the appointed hour the door-keeper of the Senate announced "a committee from the House of Representatives" and in response to an invitation from the President the committee advanced toward the clerk's desk. Senators rising to receive, Mr. Winston came first holding in his hand the resolution. Behind him came the other members of the committee, two by two, Mr. Ardrey and Mr. Carlton, Mr. Zachary and Blount.

When the desk was reached they formed in line, two of them on either side of Mr. Winston and directly in front of the president.

The incident was a dramatic one not unlike a scene from some romance of old or a page from unfamiliar history. Perfect silence reigned through out the hall. Men and women stood with half bowed heads and nobody cared to speak. The witchery of unreality hung about it all, so unusual is such a proceeding.

Now the silence is broken by the slow measured tones of Mr. Winston: "We are directed to convey to you this message of great moment." All knew the dread import of that message and a shiver seemed to run through the assemblage. Then the names of the impeached judges were called—how fearful distinctly they were pronounced.

"We now present to your honorable body certain resolutions relating to such impeachment." As Mr. Winston pronounced these words Mr. Ardrey stepped forward and handed the President the resolutions.

Then the reading went on, but impressively: "In conclusions the House of Representatives through its chosen messengers, prays that the God of Eternal Truth and Justice, may protect the right of the impeached and preserve unbroken the Constitution of our fathers."

How silent now the thronged hall! How solemn and thrilling the words! It was very tragic—the eternal tragedy of justice. I turn over the pages of history—volume after volume and wonder at the long suffering of the people and the boldness of those

Carolina of high crimes and misdemeanors in office.

In the names of the Representatives of the people, we do demand that this Senate organize a high court of impeachment; and take order that David M. Furches and Robert M. Douglas, appear at its bar, to answer the particular charges which the House of Representatives will in due time exhibit; and that the Senate do make such order and further order in the premises as may seem to them best calculated to bring this trial to a just and speedy termination.

"In conclusion the House of Representatives through its chosen messengers, prays that the God of Eternal Truth and Justice may protect the right of the impeached and preserve unbroken the Constitution of the Fathers.

"And now Mr. President, having discharged this momentous and melancholy duty, we await your answer as provided by law, which answer, we will make to those who sent us hither.

On conclusion of the above Senator London sent forward the following resolution, which was adopted.

"Resolved, that the President in behalf of the Senate announce to the gentlemen of the committee from the committee from the House of Representatives that the Senate will receive their message, duly consider the same and take proper action thereon.

Thereupon Lieutenant Governor Turner, President of the Senate, said:

"Gentlemen of the Committee: You will bear information to the House of Representatives that the Senate has received its message and will consider the same, and will take proper action thereon, as required by law, and the Constitution of the State."

On the return of the committee to the House Mr. Winston made the following report which the Speaker ordered spread upon the record:

"Mr. Speaker: In obedience to the order of the House, we, this day, proceeded to the bar of the Senate, and in the name of this body, and of all the people of the State of North Carolina, we impeached, as we were directed to do, David M. Furches, late Associate Justice and now Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, in violation of the letter and spirit of the Constitution and in defiance of the plain statutory law of the State, have usurped power subversive of the rights of the legislative department of our State Government."

"For the misconduct it declares that these officers be impeached in high crimes and misdemeanors in office. In obedience to the duty imposed upon us, we now present to your honorable body certain resolutions relating to such impeachment.

Senators: As directed by the order of the House of Representatives, and in the name of the whole people of North Carolina, whose constitution has been broken, whose laws have been defied, whose future peace is threatened and imperiled, we impeach David M. Furches, late Associate Justice and now Chief Justice, and Robert M. Douglas, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina.

The articles of impeachment are now being drawn and will probably be ready for presentation to the Senate tomorrow.

The attorneys so far selected for prosecution of the judges at the bar of the Senate are: Major Wm. A. Guthrie, Durham; James H. Poul, Raleigh; ex-Attorney General Davidson and Judge Merrimon, Asheville.

MRS. NATION IN JAIL.

She Refused to Give Bond to Keep the Peace.

Topeka, Kan., Feb. 19.—Mrs. Nation is now in the county jail as a result of her trial on a peace warrant before Judge Hazen yesterday. The warrant was sworn to by the Messer Cold Storage Company, whose plan Mrs. Nation entered Sunday morning.

Mrs. Nation acted as her own attorney in the trial. Judge Hazen placed her under \$2,000 bond to keep the peace and ordered her to appear before him at the next term of court. Mrs. Nation refused to give the bond and said she would go to jail.

She is now detained in the hospital room of the county jail, where she will probably remain for some time.

In the city court arguments were given in the case brought against Mrs. Nation by the proprietors of the wrecked "Senate" saloon. Judge McCabe said he would take the matter under advisement until Thursday morning.

It is likely that Mrs. Nation will be able to give bond, because she declares that she will resume her sewing crusade against the "joints" immediately upon her release. Her friends have been advised that Judge Hazen will make her release conditional upon the promise that she be sent to her home at Medical Lodge.

THE NEW PENSION BILL.

SPECIAL ORDER IN THE SENATE FOR LAST SATURDAY.

An Amendment Offered Insuring the Disbursement of \$200,000 Annually. Proposed Pension Scale.

Senator London has reported to the Senate the new pension law, in conformity with the wishes of the Veterans' Association, and the bill has been made a special order for noon next Saturday. The text is as follows:

A Bill to be entitled an Act to amend chapter 197 of the Laws of 1889 for the relief of Certain Confederate Soldiers and Widows.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. There shall be paid out of the treasury of the State of North Carolina, on the warrant of the Auditor, to every person who has been in the service of the State of North Carolina or of the Confederate States of America, during the war between the States, and to the widow remaining unmarried of any deceased officer, soldier or sailor who was in the service of the State of North Carolina or of the Confederate States of America during the war between the States (provided said widow was married to said soldier or sailor before the first day of April, 1865), the following sum, annually, according to the degree of disability ascertained by the following grade, viz: First, To such as have received a wound which renders them totally incompetent to perform manual labor in the ordinary avocations of life, seventy-two dollars and no more.

To such as have lost a leg above the knee or an arm above the elbow, or have a leg or arm rendered utterly useless by reason of a wound or permanent injury, forty-eight dollars; To such as have lost one eye, and all other soldiers who are now disabled from any cause to perform manual labor, thirty dollars.

Section 2. That section 3 of Chapter 198 of the laws of 1889 be amended by striking out all of said section after the word "grade" in line 4; and section 1 of said chapter 189 of the Laws of 1889 is hereby repealed and section 1 of this act substituted in place thereof.

Section 3. That all laws and clauses of laws enacted since the first day of January, 1890, granting pensions to any particular individual named therein, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. That no inmate of the Soldiers' Home at Raleigh, nor any person who was a deserter or who receives a pension from any other State or the United States, shall be entitled to a pension under this act.

Section 5. That all ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors who have become totally blind since the war, or who lost their sight or both feet in the Confederate service, shall receive from the Public Treasury \$120 a year to be paid monthly by the clerk of the superior court of their respective counties, as provided in the Public Laws of 1879, chapter 193, and the amendment thereto in chapter 341 of the Laws of 1883 and chapter 619 of the Laws of 1889.

When the bill was read in the Senate yesterday Senator London introduced the following important amendment which was adopted:

"If the fund collected from the special pension tax in any year should be insufficient to pay in full the pensions allowed by this act, then and in the event the State Treasurer shall pay said pensions out of any public funds not otherwise appropriated, provided, however, that in no year shall the total amount paid for pensions exceed \$305,000."

The bill passed its third reading in the Senate Saturday by a vote of 18 yeas and 12 nays.
