NEWS OVER THE STATE.

Interesting North Carolina Items In Condensed Form.

Mr. C. C. Hunter's residence at Warrenton was destroyed by fire Friday morning.

The disbanded company of State guards at Rutherfordton has been reorganized under new officers and asks to be reinstated.

The election on a dispensary in Mountsboro resulted in a vote against a dispensary. Local option prohibition continues.

Tarboro Southerner: The Carolina Telephone and Telegraph company have declared their usual quarterly dividend of one and one-half per cent.

The Presbyterian church at Burlington was struck by lightning Saturday evening, about 6 o'clock, and set on fire. It was damaged at least \$1,000.

The directors of the Oxford orphanage have re-elected the old officers three of the old teachers and five new ones. B. N. Duke retires as a director.

The third annual session of the State Bar association finished their business Friday morning. Chas. M. Busbee, of Raleigh, was elected president for the ensuing year.

The State has chartered the Raleigh Hosiery company, capital \$75,000, stockholders William W. Ashe, S. A. Ashe, Jr., and S. A. Ashe. The company will manufacture hosiery and yarns.

Rufus Burton, who shot and killed Policeman Wood at Advance, Davie county, June 8, has been captured at Ivanhoe, Va., and will be brought back for trial as soon as requisition papers can be secured.

Special Deputy, J. D. Grimsley and aides seized a whiskey distillery and five barrels of whiskey near Seven Springs Saturday on account of irregularities. The still and whiskey were taken to White Hall.

The Statesville Landmark says that Chief Justice Furches and Judge Coble have both given in their income for taxation though they are personally of the opinion that they are not liable to the tax.

Sanford Express: The cultivated blackberry is now one of the most profitable fruits raised in this county. Large shipments are being made from Southern Pines to the Northern markets at good prices.

It is understood that the Seaboard Air-Line has closed its shops at Raleigh. Not many men were employed. The shops have not been ranked as important by the company for several years. There is an unverified rumor that the company will locate the shops at Hamlet.

Theophilus Hunter Hill died Saturday morning at 9:25 o'clock at his residence in Raleigh after three weeks' illness with fever. This announcement will cause deep regret all over the State, for the deceased was a poet whose writings were widely read and much admired. Mr. Hill was born in Raleigh 64 years ago.

Henry C. Crown, engineer, and Charley Strickland, fireman, were injured by the engine of the Enterprise Lumber company near Smithfield jumping track. The Herald says Mr. Brown was badly bruised but not seriously. Mr. Strickland's right leg was broken. Injuries were very serious, though not necessarily fatal.

Alamance Gleaner: The Burlington Daily Messenger is reported as temporarily suspended, but that it will be resumed shortly under the editorial management of Capt. R. G. Foster. It is stated that the editor and manager A. Campbell McKibbin, left suddenly Saturday for parts unknown, and there are various rumors as to his sudden departure.

Campbell McKibbin, the editor of the Daily Messenger, who left town so unceremoniously Saturday week ago. As stated by your correspondent, many rumors were afloat. One of these accused the gentleman of an intrigue with a married woman in this place, and further stated that her husband invited him to depart within 24 hours. It seems that the parties most interested were in apparent ignorance till Thursday when it came to their ears. The husband then began making inquiries and threatening those who had been talking with blowing holes through them. He then issued a circular offering \$100 reward for information as to the whereabouts of McKibbin.

The huckleberry season will last about ten days longer. Conservative persons estimate that the crops will bring at least \$100,000 to Sampson county.
