The Assassination of President McKinley.

Shot Twice by an Anarchist at the Buffalo Exposition. One Bullet Enters the Chest, the Other the Abdomen.

A WOMAN AT THE BOTTOM OF IT.

Incited to the Deed by a Speech of a Woman. The Assassin a Polish Jew and Says He Did His Duty. He Came From Cleveland Ohio, the Hot Bed of Anarchists.

NO EXCUSE, POLITICAL, OR OTHERWISE, FOR THE DASTARDLY ATTEMPT.

CAREER OF ASSASSIN.

Mr. McKinley Possesses Wonderful Calmness. His First Thought Was of His Invalid Wife.

PHYSICIANS HOPEFUL OF RECOVERY.

It was a few minutes after 4 o'clock p. m. while President McKinley was holding a public reception in the great Temple of Music on the Pan-American grounds that the cowardly attack was made, with what success time alone can tell.

THE CRIME.

It was shortly after 4 o'clock when one of the throng which surrounded the presidential party, a medium size man of ordinary appearance and plainly dressed in black, approached 's if to greet the presi ent. Both Secretary Cortelyou and President Milburn noticed that the man's hand was swathed in a bandage or handkerchief.

Reports of by-standers differ as to his hand. He worked his way amid the stream of people up to the edge of the dais until he was within two feet of the president.

By this time the crush was terrific. Spectators crowded down the stairway from the galleries, the crowd on the floor surged forward toward the room while despite the strenuous effort of police and guards the throng without struggled madly to obtain admission.

THE PRISONER'S STATEMENT.

Buffalo, Sept. 7.—The statement of Leon Czolgosz made to the police, transcribed and signed by the prisoner is as follows:

"I was born in Detroit nearly twenty-nine years ago. My parents were Russian Poles. They came here forty-two years ago. I got my education in public schools of Detroit and then went to Cleveland, where I got work. In Cleveland I read books on socialism and met a great many Socialists. I was pretty well known as a Socialist in the West. After being in Cleveland for several years I went to Chicago, where I remained seven months, after which I went to Newburg, on the outskirts of Cleveland and went to work in the Newburg wire mills.

THE PRISONER

The president's assailant in meantime had been hustled to the rear of the building by the exposition guards, where he was held while the building was cleared and later he was turned over to Superintendent Bull of the Buffalo police department, who took the prisoner to No. 13 police station and afterward to police headquarters.

THE CRY OF "LYNCH HIM."

It was at this juncture that some one raised the cry of "Lynch him." Like a flash the cry was taken up and the whole crowd as if ignited by the single match thus applied re-echoed the cry "Lynch him!" Hang "him!" Closer the crowd surged forward, denser the throng became as new arrivals swelled the swaying multitude. The situation was becoming critical when suddenly the big doors were flung open and a squad of reserves arrived with solid front, drove the crowd back from the curb, then across the street and then gradually succeeded in dispersing them from about the entrance to the station.

MCKINLEY WONDERFUL CALMNESS.

After the first shock of the assassin shots, he retreated a step, then as the detectives leaped upon his assailant, he turned, walked steadily to a chair and seated himself, at same time removing his hat and bowing his head in his hands.

N. C. CENSUS ISSUED.

There are 781,826 Children of School Age, 490 Foreign Born. Colored Persons of School Age 34.6 Per Cent of Whole.

AND SHOWS FEW FOREIGNERS.

Washington, August 31.—The census bureau today issued a bulletin giving the number of persons of school, militia and voting ages in North Carolina for the census year 1901.

Colored persons of school age constitute 34.9 per cent of the whole number of persons of school age and comprise chiefly persons of negro descent. In North Carolina males of militia age are practically all of native birth. Males of voting age are substantially all of native birth, only six tenths of 1 per cent of the whole number being of foreign birth. Among the males of voting age, as a whole, there is a considerable proportion of illiterates, the percentage being 19.4. This somewhat large percentage is due principally to the presence among males of voting age of a large number of illiterate persons of negro descent.


