780 People Burned Alive In a Theatre at Chicago

Mostly Women and Children. An Apalling Scene.

At an evening performance in the Iroquois Theater, in the city of Chicago, where the audience consisted of women and children mostly, a fire broke out and resulted in the burning alive of near as can be ascertained seven hundred and eighty persons.

Such a scene and catastrophe can not be pictured by pen or imagined in one's mind. The following incident will give a small of idea of the horror and distress.

Miss Georgia Swift, probinent in society, was badly battered and bruised in the panic in the theater. In talking of her experiences to-day, she said:

"I started up the aisle at about the same time as all the others, I suppose. My seat was on the first floor near the stage, and when I reached the rear of the auditorium the aisle was choked with people who had fallen

"I looked down to avoid stepping on them and just as I did so my eyes were caught by those of a little boy about seven years old, who was lying on the floor unable to rise. He had large brown eyes and was so neatly dressed and apparently so well bred and such a little gentleman that he fascinated me. As he saw me looking at him, he said: 'Woa..t you please please help me; please do.

"I stopped to raise him if I could but the crowd was too thick and the rush too strong. I seized him under the arms, and then I was knocked over him onto my knees in the aisle. I struggled to my feet, but the weight of the crowd was such that I could not turn back and I was carried out through the door. The little boy was unquestionably trampled to death, and the memory of those eyes of his will hunt me while I live."
