Oklahoma and New Mexico Admitted as States.

Arizona Will Remain a Territory Until Conditions Justify Separate Statehood—Manufacture and Sale of Liquor in Oklahoma Prohibited for Twenty-one Years.

Washington, Feb., 7.—After a field day of brilliant debate and bewildering parliamentary maneuvers, marked with much excitement and lasting from noon until 8:50 o'clock tonight without intermission, the Senate passed the House statehood bill in amended form. The bill as passed admits Oklahoma and Indian Territory as a single state and New Mexico as another. All reference to Arizona was cut from the bill. It now goes to conference, the House having passed it April 19 last.

The proposition to restrict the sale of alcoholic liquors in the territories occupied the Senate for about an hour and three-quarters. As reported by the committee, this limitation was for ten years within Indian Territory, and perpetually in relation to the Indians.

As amended by a vote of 55 to 20, by what is known generally as the Stone-Gallinger proposition, the term during which prohibition is to be extended over the state is for twenty-one years, and will extend not only over Indian Territory, but Oklahoma as well.

RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.

Three Months Railway Accidents Kill 1,032 Persons and Injure 13,207.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has issued a report on railroad accidents in the United States during the months of July, August and September, 1904, showing 228 passengers and 183 employees killed and 2,154 passengers and 1,593 employees injured in train accidents.

Other accidents to passengers and employes, not the result of collisions or derailments, bring the aggregate casualties for the quarter up to 1,032 killed and 13,207 injured. There were 1,489 collisions and 1,321 derailments, the damage to cars engines and roadway being \$2,439,073.

The report says that, while these figures show a gratifying decrease in the number of employes killed, the three months as a whole may be termed the most disastrous one quarter on record in fatal accidents to passengers.

Life of a \$10,000,000 Baby.

Worth \$10,000,000 in his own name John Nicholas Brown, 4 years old, has arrived here with his mother, says a Newport, R. I., dispatch.

John Nicholas Brown is a type of the "sterilized baby." His grandmother is a great stickler for sanitation and sterilization, and even the big granite iron spoon with which John Nicholas makes mud pies is sterilized. The milk, the water, the food, the clothing, the bedding—everything is sterilized.

It is a lonely and isolated life John Nicholas is living. He can't play with the gardner's little boy because he isn't sterilized, and, besides he isn't rich. He can't play with other rich children because they are not as rich as he is. He must try to let his nurse who gets \$200 a month, amuse him. This is the program of John Nicholas Brown:

7 a. m.—John Nicholas Brown, 4 years old, rises for a bath in distilled scented water.

7:30 a. m.—Breakfast; boiled egg from a \$3000 collection of blooded Leghorn hens; ripe fruit, patent breakfast food, and a glass of hot sterilized milk from a \$10,000 Jersey cow, which grazes in a \$100,000 pasture.

8 a. m.—Dressed in silk underwear, knitted to measure, fine outer garments, and a white broadtail coat, costing \$2000.

8:30 a. m.—Sun bath in big bay window.

9:30 a. m.—Kisses his beautiful young mother good morning as she goes to breakfast, and he leaves the house with his \$200 a month nurse for a walk.

11 a. m.—Drives his \$4000 shetland pony to a \$10,000 basket cart.

12 m.—Lunch: bowl of sterilized patent food and sterilized milk from the \$10,000 cow; ripe fruit.

1 p. m.—Mud pie making in the back yard in a pair of 25 cent overalls.

2 p. m.—Nap on a \$500 mattress made from curled hair from the tails of pure white colts.

4 p. m.—To the beach for a play.

6 p. m.—Hot dinner of sterilized foods.

7 p. m.—To bed in gorgeous \$5000 golden crib.—CHICAGO INTER-OCEAN.

Minister Goes to Manchuria to Sound Japanese. Struggle Unpopular at Home; People Demand End of it. Tired of Conflict. Press Loses Heart.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 7. Peace sentiment is growing throughout Russia at a rate that alarms the bureaucrats. These latter insist that Emperor Nicholas' oft-repeated declaration that the war must be carried to a satisfactory conclusion remains the keynote of the situation.

Despite this insistence, it is apparent that the temper of the people will not much longer tolerate the war which has never been popular. The whole present trend of press and public opinion is toward a speedy termination of hostilities, and the demand is growing so rapidly that officialdom cannot much longer refuse to heed it.

It is in fact, admitted, semi-officially, that Czar Nicholas has already taken cognizance of this demand, and that he may before long intimate a willingness to conclude terms with Japan.

M. Admabasa, director of the Committee of the Far East, has been dispatched to Manchuria on an important mission. The nature of this mission is not revealed, but it is believed that M. Admabasa has gone to the theatre of war to report directly to the Emperor whether or not it is possible to reach the compromise with Japan without material prejudice to Russia's interests.
