A METHODIST HOST NEARLY 5 MILLIONS UNION OF BAPTISTS HAS NO CANDIDATE AHOSKIE ICE CO.,

The South Atlantic Missionary Conference Convened in Asheville.

2,000 GATHERED AT ASHEVILLE

Asheville N. C., May 17.—Methodists of the Southern Church to the number of almost two thousand, are here to attend the session of the South Atlantic Missionary Conference, which convened in the auditorium to-night for a four days' convention.

This is the third gathering of the kind that has been held. The movement was organized in New Orleans in 1901, and was followed by a great gathering, at Waco, Texas, last year. The Asheville conference promises to excel either of the previous gatherings, in both attendance and interest. The conference was opened to-night with a sermon by Bishop E. E. Hors, D. D. A large number of delegates and their families arrived yesterday afternoon and last night, while every incoming train today has been crowded with the followers of John Wesley.

Some Interesting Delegates.

Asheville, N. C. May 17.—The third annual South Atlantic Missionary Conference of the Southern Methodist Church opened at the Auditorium to-night with 2,000 delegates in attendance. One thousand additional delegates are scheduled to arrive tomorrow, the total number being the largest representation ever accorded to a convention of any sort in this city. Among the prominent missionaries who are already in attendance and who will be here during the conference are; Dr. D. W. Carrer, of Havana, superintendent of all work in Cuba; W. G. Fletcher and Mrs. Fletcher, of Santiago, Cuba; W. P. Turner of Japan; W. B. Burke, China and R. A. Hardie, of Korea. The capacity of the Auditorium, which seats 4,000 people was tested to the utmost tonight and many were unable to gain admittance.

Grand Lodge Hears of Wealth in Opening Session at Scranton, Pennsylvania

THE WEALTH OF ODD FELLOWS IN PA. ALONE.

The eighty-second annual convention of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Pennsylvania was begun in the Lyceum Theatre at 10 o'clock this morning.

After the call to order by Grand Master Robert Graham, of Philadelphia Mayor Alexander T. Connell was introduced by F. C. Hanyen, secretary of the local committee, and delivered an address of welcome. The response was made by Grand Master Graham.

The grand master presented his annual report recommending that an appropriation be made for revising the Pennsylvania Digest that enlarged scope be given to the Committee on Homes and Kindred Charities, subordinate lodges be required to give more careful attention to the returns of their available assets, that elective officers shall not be chosen trustees and that a commensurate appropriation be made for the Home for Widows of Odd Fellows.

Treasurer M. Richards Muckle reported that the assets of the Grand Lodge are \$48,312.50, and of subordinate lodges \$4,454,760.61.

The man gave his name as Daniel Constable. He was later committed to St. Elizabeth hospital for the insane.

E. W. Stevens is Made President, Death of Dr. Cushing in the Convention Hall

GEN'L. CONVENTION OF NO. AMERICA.

St. Louis Mo., May 17.—Organization of a permanent body to be known as the General Convention of Baptists of North America, was perfected today by the election of the following officers:

President, E. W. Stephens, of Columbia Mo., first vice-president, E. M. Dresser, Ohio, second vice-president, Joshua Levering, Maryland; third vice-president, Thomas B. Trotter Nova Scotia; secretary, J. S. Prestridge Kentucky; treasurer, H. E. Kirk, Porter Pa.

Just as the Baptist Convention was about to adjourn today Dr. Cushing president of the Baptist University Rangoon, Ind., was stricken while occupying the rostrum and fell by dying to the floor. While waiting for the arrival of an ambulance a prayer was offered for Dr. Cushing. Before the arrival of medical assistance, Dr. Cushing died.

The report of the committee of nine, appointed at a conference in New York in last January, recommending permanent organization, was read by Chairman E. M. Thresher, of Ohio.

Rev. Dr. Judson of New York son of Adoniram Judson, who was one of the first missionaries of the Baptist church, made a motion that the report be adopted.

The motion was seconded by Rev. W. E. Hatcher of Virginia. "I think there is wisdom and strength in the adoption of this plan of uniting the Baptists of the North and South," said he. "This action sends a message to the outside and tells friends and critics alike that so far as the American Baptists are concerned there is an infinite difference between separation and division. We are separated in our work, but this action will declare to the world that we are not divided. There is now no cause that stand in the way of our union of heart and cordial fraternity. In closing I want to say that, although I am a Democrat I think that the power of one man to unify this country and help towards effecting a unity of the world has been the supreme event in American history. I feel that we must be united, not only in the church, for the one great purpose that may lead to the salvation of the nations. I therefore, with great heartiness and all cordiality second the motion to adopt this committee's resolution."

TRIP SOUTH HIS LAST WHILE PRESIDENT

Determined not to be a candidate for president, President Roosevelt has also decided that he will do nothing to influence the public's choice of his successor.

In order to demonstrate that, so far as he is himself is concerned, the field is open to all Presidential aspirants, The President has declared that the trip he intends to take through the South the first two weeks in October will be the last trip of his administration.

After that he will remain close at home, in order that he may avert even the suspicion of attempting to effect public sentiment respecting the next Presidential candidate.

Ever since the Chicago convention it has been charged by politicians that the president was creating a machine of his own within the Republican party that would dominate the convention and name either the President himself as the candidate or a man of his selection.
