GRADED SCHOOL IN SIGHT.

It Means More Than all the Mills, Banks, Lawyers, Merchants or Anything, For the Upbuilding of the People and Town.

On Thursday of last week our citizens took the first step towards a Graded School. A meeting was held. Not a large meeting, but one that was representative of our whole community.

Mr. R. W. Askew presided and Mr. C. A. Cooke acted as secretary. There was a free interchange of opinions.

Remarks were made by Messrs. R. W. Askew, J. T. Nicholls, E. S. Dail, G. L. Mardre, Thomas Gillam, C. A. Cooke, E. L. Gatling, W. L. Lyon, Sol Cherry Francis D. Winston and others whose names escaped us.

On motion of Gov. Winston a committee of five, consisting of R. W. Askew, chairman, Thomas Gillam, J. T. Nicholls, G. L. Mardre and Francis D. Winston was appointed to get up all needed information facts and statistics and to recommend a district boundaries.

The committee on motion of Sol Cherry Esq, was afterwards enlarged and Messrs. W. M. Davis and Sol Cherry were added to the committee.

The work is now in their hands. If there is an effort to placate a lot of people, to leave out one and put in another when the matter had as well be dropped. This is a matter of importance. It is no child's play.

The district should be compact, of decent shape, of size sufficient to furnish the number needed for a successful school and the tax to run it without burdening the taxpayers.

We are sure the majority of the committee can agree on some plan that will result on the school.

It would not be proper for us to hamper the committee with suggestions. They will receive a thousand of them.

The Ledger is ready to promote the work in any way. Its columns are at the disposal of the public on this question.

What it wants is a good school in Windsor supported by the public where every white child within our limits can attend and from which he can go to any college in the State. The community that is not supporting such a school is accomplishing but little and at an enormous expense.

Education is a blessing common to all. It should be furnished all free of tuition.

The Ledger has worked for such a school many months. It is a pleasing satisfaction to contemplate this beginning.

The directors of the County Farm made this report through Jno. Mitchell their Chairman, which was approved.

Ordered, That, Jno. S. Drew, be paid for lumber on road 2.75

Ordered, That, amount paid the Deputy Sheriff of Warren County, be added to the J. P. costs here in said case, now pending for trial.

Ordered, That, John Ryan have refunded on marriage license 2.00

Ordered, That, Jos Cherry have refunded to him on Marriage license 2.00.

The Board adjourned at 11:30 and to meet with the Board of Magistrates of Bertie County for the purpose of levying the taxes of Bertie County for the year of 1905. After the meeting of the Joint Board and the levying of taxes, the Board of County Commissioners, resumed business at 1 p.m.

Ordered, That W. M. Davis Mayor of Windsor, N. C. be given to help defray the expenses of the artesian well 600.00.

Ordered, That A. C. Mitchell be allowed for the damage to his horse in crossing the Windsor bridge 1.00.00

The jury box was purged according to law.

T. C. Bond submitted his report as Treasurer, which was approved and ordered registered.

Dr. H. V. Dunstan Supt. of Health submitted report, which was accepted and approved.
