## COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION.

The Routine Business of Auditing and Paying Accounts Transacted. Mr. J. H. White the Newly Appointed Member of the Board Qualifies.

### MIR. C. W. SPRUILL IS ELECTED CHAIRMAN.

The Board of County Commissioners met at the usual hour. Members present: C. W. Spruill, R. J. Shield, Dr. L. A. Nowell, Dr. Wayland Mitchell and J. H. White. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. On motion of Dr. Wayland Mitchell C. W. Spruill was elected Chairman of the Board to fill the unexpired term of George I. Mardre who resigned as commissioner and Chairman of the Board. J. H. White having been appointed to fill the vacancy of the Board, qualified according to law and took his seat as a member of said Board.

Ordered that Sheriff Stokes buy chairs for the jury rooms.

Ordered that Craig Mill site and pond be valued at \$300 and that back taxes be collected on the same.

Ordered that W. W. Hughes be and is hereby appointed constable of Whites Township and he immediately tendered his bond constable which was accepted.

Ordered that J. R. Chery be and is hereby appointed guardian of Lumber Bridge, in Snakebite Township, and that he be notified of said appointment.

Ordered that Charlotte Jordan be given as temporary help \$3. and put on the regular poor list at \$3.

Ordered that Mrs. Sallie Hoggard be given as temporary help \$3. and be put on the regular poor list at \$3.

Ordered that the valuation of Mrs. Jos. H. Etheridge's, Lawrence farm be reduced in value to \$2,000 and that she be refunded the tax on \$1000 valuation of said farm, the said farm having been heretofore valued at \$3000.

### FARMERS, ORGANIZE!

It is gratifying to see the movement that is on foot in Windsor to establish a cotton and peanut warehouse. It means something to the farmers of this county. It is the only plan to take care of the depressed crops the hard worked farmers grow to be sold at a certain date. Organization and warehouses seem to me the only remedy. It is the only system by which we can beat the bears and speculators.

Is there any reason why cotton, two months ago, should be 13 cents, and to day 11? It has as much material value or worth to day as it will have tomorrow, or as it had yesterday. So there is but one real or honest cause for a fluctuation in price, namely: the law of supply and demand.

Organize. You cannot get a fair price for your product unless you ask for it. So let's get together. What say you brother farmer? If the men had as much sticking quality as their wives there would be a sounding the clarion call to organize but once. Better prices will benefit everybody—the banker, the merchant, the lawyer, the editor, the doctor, every trade or profession. So I hope many will take stock and work in the warehouse begun. Don't let it lag.

I was gratified to read an editorial in the Ledger the other week, in which the editor made some timely suggestions and gave the farmers a good common sense talk. I am glad to have him on the side of organization with us, and now feel like we are going to do something.

As to the Cotton and Peanut Holding Company. I would urge every body to patronize it and push it along by subscribing to it. The merchants are interested and will do their part but they need the cooperation of the producers. Don't think your help will only be a little, but remember that old adage that it takes the drops of rain to swell the mighty rivers.

Organize. Build a bonded warehouse. Then say to the buyer—give me what I ask for my own property and you can have it.
