#### PELLEGRA INCREASING

Public Health Service Announces Cause and Suggests a Rem-

edy-Fake Cures

Pellegra seems to be on the Virginia Rhea, of Windsor. increase. This is true not so much of North Carolina, perhaps, as elsewhere. A very probable answer to the why and wherefore of the situation is offered by Joseph Goldberger, surgion in charge of pellegra investigation for the United States Pub-

lic Health Service. Dr. Goldberger claims that in Norfolk with relatives, pellegra is not contagious, infectious or even communicable, but is due to a faulty diet. The trouble with the diets of people who develop pellegra, according to Surgeon Goldberger, is that Ahoskie, spent Sunday and Monday they do not eat enough lean meat, beans, peas, milk and eggs, but eat disproportionately large amounts of such things as grits, molasses, flakes, corn

meal or starchy foods. As a general rule, according to Dr. Goldberger's findings, pellegra is particularly a disease of the p. or, or where it does strike an individual member of a wellto do family it is one that for some reason has not been eating a well balanced diet, Accordingly the apparent increase in pellegra is due to a more restricted diet owing, perhaps; to the recent slightly depressed financial conditions among our people

The daily diet recommended by Dr. Goldberger for an adult pellegrin should include a pint at least four eggs and a half pound of fresh, lean meat, toether with a liberal allowance of peas and beans. These articles of diet should be varied somewhat from time to time to suit the taste of the patient. Very little, if any, medicines are recommended or are found necessary. In this connection Dr. Goldberger cites some causes of more or less fraudulent socalled pellegra cures that are being heralded as sure cures for 10. pellegra at good, stiff prices and what's more, their patrons are getting cured. According to Dr. Goldberger, it matters little whether a person is given a solution of salt and water, sugar and water or any other cheap concoction at a dollar or two an liberally of such things as meat, milk, eggs, beans and peas the chances of his getting well are cure.
