Chris Hilbert, Program Administrator for Holland's Consultation discussed pos-

The three options available to applicants would be buyouts, physical elevation of the home or complete rebuilding.

"These options have not been approved, so it does not mean that if you fill out an application you automati-

cally get assistance; but, the application will be on file when they are approved," said Hilbert.

Currently the Bertie County Planning Office is taking applications.

"If you want help, you must fill out an application," added Hilbert.

Hilbert also explained there was a second meeting in Greenville with representatives from East Carolina University and North Carolina State University.
