

Perry selected Chief Deputy

WINDSOR-Bertie County Sheriff John Holley has named a new Chief Deputy.

Kenny Perry, who has served for the past year as Lieutenant, has been chosen to fill the spot which has been vacant since Greg Atkins retired.

"I wanted to make sure I took my time and found the right person for the job," Sheriff Holley said. "The staff highly respects Kenny and he has proven himself as a hardworking officer. I have confidence he'll do a great job."

Perry joined the Ber-

tie County Sheriff's Office in 2002 when Atkins was sheriff, and was promoted to Corporal two years later. He took over sexual assault investigations in 2006, and then began working in all areas of the sheriff's office.

"I did a little bit of everything," he said. "I filled in wherever I was needed - be that in patrol or doing investigations."

Last year, Sheriff Holley promoted Perry to take the place of the retiring Lt. Carl Hoggard. At that time, he began overseeing the entire patrol division. His du-
