TRAP - Bertie County roads claimed another victim this weekend.

According to the North Carolina State Highway Patrol, an individual died after a twocar automobile accident on Saturday.

David Perry and Larry Grandberry, both of Colerain, were occupants of a gold Mercury traveling west on Nowell Farm Road.

The vehicle ran off the right side of the road and the driver overcorrected to the left.
