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# New fire truck rolls into Windsor Vehicle will replace two trucks

WINDSOR – It arrived complete with bells and whistles – literally.

The Windsor Fire Department brought home its newest member Monday afternoon - a brand new Spartan Fire Truck.

Mayor Jim Hoggard, Town Administrator Allen Castelloe, Fire Chief Bobby Capehart, Commissioners Cathy Wilson, Lawrence Carter Jr. and Amy Williford, and a host of firemen were on hand to inspect the

new vehicle.

The new truck - which features a 1,250 gallon pump, and dual extraction tools - has been under construction for more than a year.

"The truck is built to not only serve our citizens, but our neighbors and anyone in Bertie County when we are requested," Windsor Fireman Josh Kilpatrick said.

Kilpatrick, who served on the committee of firemen who led the purchase, said the truck has a generator

WINDSOR - The tax rate

and the town of Wind-Commissioners sor met in a special meeting Monday afternoon to receive updates and discuss future updates about hurricane relief funding.

Holland Consulting Planner Chris Hilbert explained at a meting in Roper, that there is \$114,000,000 available in the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP).

This funding is available for counties that submitted applications for properties that received damage from the floods of Hurricane Matthew last year.

"The amount of funding authorized will only provide funding to onethird of the properties that applied. The state is looking at a bill to add state money," said Hilbert.

According to Hilbert, 102 properties in the town of Windsor and throughout Bertie County completed an

The Windsor Board of Commissioners unanimously approved the 2017-2018 budget ordinance at its regular meeting June 8.

The new budget contains no tax increase for citizens as the ad valorem tax rate will remain at 14.5 cents per \$100 valuation. There are also no increases in garbage collection, water, sewer or electric rates.

The general fund revexpenditures enues for next fiscal year are estimated at slightly more than \$2.8 million, with the electric fund at just under \$5.3 million. Other budget figures include water fund (\$343,000), sewer fund (\$624,700) and project funds (\$549,266).

The total budget is just more than \$9.65 million.

Windsor will make a few changes in expenditures this year, increas-
