has long been one of the challenges in attracting and retaining qualified school personnel.

Commissioner Wesson also expounded on several other programs in trying to meet the immediate needs of some of the lower income students in our school i.e., the backpack program that will ultimately leading to children receiving nutrition that they would otherwise go lacking.
