According to the National Weather Service Weather Forecast Office in Wakefield Va's report from 6 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 11, Hurricane Florence has the possibility to strengthen over the

As of press time, Hurricane Florence is classified as a category four storm with maximum sustained winds of 130 miles per hour, increasing the risk of lifethreatening impacts, including storm surge and inland flooding.

There is an increasing confidence in widespread rainfall totals of six-to-12 inches, with potential for more.


According to Bertie County Manager Scott Sauer, Bertie County Chairman Ernestine Bazemore signed a State of Emergency for Bertie County, which went into

Despite four years passing, the N.C. Highway Patrol is still working on two cases involving hit-and-run deaths.

NCHP 1st Sgt. Rodney W. Sawyer said the organization is still searching for answers in the hit-and-run deaths of Victoria Little of Williamston

On Aug. 10, 2014, Little was struck by a vehicle while lying in the roadway of U.S. 13

"The vehicle which struck Ms. Little failed to stop at the scene," Sgt. Sawyer said. "Investigators were unable to locate any evidence indi-
