ReBuild NC Center to close Nov. 29

WINDSOR—The ReBuild NC application center in Windsor is scheduled to close Nov. 29. The office, which is located at 1001 South King Street in Windsor, was open to allow those eligible for assistance due to Hurricane Matthew to apply. While the center will close, those eligible to apply for assistance can still apply for help. Those eligible must have had damage by Hurricane Matthew in 2016.

ReBuild NC is helping applicants seek help from the Hurricane Matthew Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery. Those who have already made an application will be able to continue contact with staff via telephone and email. Once the center closes, homeowners may call 2-1-1 to schedule an appointment at another application center to complete an application, submit documentation or meet with an
