York Street pump will be flood proof

New station being paid for by grant from Golden Leaf

WINDSOR - The animals at Livermon Park and Mini Zoo may well be curious about a new project near the entrance to the facility on York Street in Windsor.

A new flood proof sewage pumping station approved with a no-match grant is under construction by The Wooten Company from Greenville.

The Golden Leaf Foundation awarded the town a grant in the Disaster Recovery Program. The project estimated costs at \$508,885.

Windsor's first system was built in 1919 under then Mayor John Gatlin. According to retired Windsor Town Administrator and current Windsor Commissioner David Overton said the station

People seek help with 'unnatural' flooding incidents

WINDSOR - Nearly 200 farmers. foresters, landowners and local leaders from along the Roanoke River came together on Feb. 21 to discuss continual flooding "not caused by natural events."

Sen. Erica Smith (D-3) teamed up with the Bertie County Commissioners and their chairman, John Trent, to bring leaders to the table in search of resolution.

Counties represented included Bertie, Halifax. Martin, Northampton and Washington. Landowners also came from Virginia to speak during the meeting.

"We are here to discuss the impacts of the flooding of the lower Roanoke River," Chairman Trent explained.

"A disaster that continues to ruin our crop lands, timber production and results in loss

of hundreds of thousands of dollars which support our farmers, residents and employ-

ees," he continued. Sen. Bob Steinburg (R-1), Rep. Eddie Godwin (R-1) as well as representatives from the offices of G.K. Butterfield, Thom Tillis and Richard Burr were also in attendance.

Frustrations have continued to grow on the part of landowners along the river as naturally-sourced flooding compounded by "manmade releases of water controlled by the John H. Kerr Dam near the Virginia border and is controlled by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers," according to

Former Congressman Frank Ballance dies at 77
