WPD, WRC thwart prison contraband

WINDSOR - Attempts to smuggle contraband into Bertie Correctional Institute failed yet again.

Windsor Police Chief Justin Jackson said his call, Windsor Police Lt. officers worked with N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission Officer Rodney Jack to thwart an attempt to smuggle cell phones and tobacco into the prison.

Officer Jack found a suspicious vehicle parked near the prison on April 17 and contacted the Windsor Po-

lice Department. While checking on the unoccupied vehicle, Officer Jack found the plates being displayed were fictitious and also saw opened cell phone packages inside the car.

After receiving the Frank Ratzlaff and Officer Jessie Mizelle went to the prison to see if they could locate the owners of the vehicle.

Officer Mizelle located two suspects walking near the vehicle both of whom were backpacks. wearing

Commission approves deputy raises

WINDSOR - May paychecks will reflect a positive change for certified deputies with the Bertie County Sheriff's Office.

"The Board has taken a fairly bold step," County Manager Scott Sauer said.

On April 16, Bertie County Commissioners held a special called meeting and went directly into closed session.

Once the meeting reconvened in open ses-

sion, Commissioner Ronald D. Wesson made a motion to increase certified deputy sheriff position base pay to \$40,000. The change would go into effect, based on the motion, with the May 2019 paycheck.

Wesson included within this motion to eliminate the \$2,500 signing bonus and included that five of the existing vacant deputy sheriff positions be "frozen immediately," per the county manag-
