WPD stops fraudulent prescription

An attempt to fill a fraudulent prescription landed a man behind bars in Windsor.

Windsor Police Chief Justin Jackson said Lt. Frank Ratzlaff said he was called to Pittman's Pharmacy after staff members advised a doctor did not prescribe a medicine called in there.

The incident began June 27 when Lt. Ratzlaff was contacted by pharmacy staff and informed a person had sought to fill a prescription fraudulently. The

pharmacy staff had contacted the doctor's office about the prescription and determined the doctor did not call it in.

The person trying to fill the prescription made contact with the pharmacy and was supposed to pick up the medicine that day, but never showed up.

Nearly a week later on July 2, Lt. Ratzlaff was called by Bertie County Central Dispatch and advised the suspect had arrived to pick up the fraudulent prescrip-

The Windsor Police Department arrested two men on drug charges following surveillance July 2.

Windsor Police Chief Justin Jackson said Lt. Frank Ratzlaff and Officer Jessie Mizelle were patrolling in town when they observed suspicious activity in the area of Wall Street and Lee Street.

Following a patrol of the area, the of-

ficers were traveling behind the suspect vehicle when the operator failed to use a turn signal as he made the turn onto Sterlingworth Street.

Following a traffic stop, officers had both the driver and passenger step out of the car and received permission to search the vehicle.

The officers found three bags of heroin, 1.2 grams of cocaine and a
