RALEIGH - North Carolina school districts have the option to return to school next month.

Late Tuesday afternoon, N.C. Governor Roy Cooper announced the state would

move forward with option B of opening schools, which will be a mix of in-school learning and remote learn-

"As summer rolls on, many students and parents are discussing the return to school every day," the governor said. "The reality is the dis-

With that, Gov. Cooper announced the state was planning to enter Plan B and open schools in a "careful way."

He said all school districts would have the ability to provide in-person learning, balanced learning or remote learning. The governor did say each school district must provide a plan for re-

> He called Plan B a "measured, balanced" approach and said it includes provisions for safety when it comes to COVID-19, including face coverings for students, teachers and staff as well as social distancing.

WPD: Two face drug charges

WINDSOR - Two people are facing drug charges following a traffic stop July 9.

Windsor Police Chief Justin Jackson said officers stopped a vehicle on King Street between Jasper Bazemore Avenue and Cooper Hill Road, and that led to two of the car's three occupants facing drug-related charges.

Windsor Police Officer Jessie Mizelle and Lt. Frank Ratzlaff stopped a car they knew to have fictitious tags. The operator of the vehicle reportedly pulled into a driveway.

When Officer Mizelle approached the vehicle he said he noticed the driver and front passenger "doing a lot of moving as if to hide items in the vehicle."

As he approached the vehicle, Officer Mizelle reported the odor of green marijuana coming from the car. In addition, he reportedly noticed an empty bag he believed to be a heroin bag in the center console area.

Upon receiving permission, Officer Mizelle searched the driver identified as 20-year-old Collin Oneal Rose – and the vehicle.
