Death toll is 20

COVID-19 cases on the rise

Bertie County lost its 20th resident to COV-ID-19 last week.

Albemarle Regional Health Services (ARHS) announced the death of the person who was over 65 years of age, and died due to complications from COVID-19. The death was not related to any facility outbreaks.

ARHS released no other details to protect the family's privacy.

Cases continue to rise in Bertie County, as the worldwide pandemic keeps growing. Bertie County now has 31 active cases of the novel Coronavirus. There have been 724 total cases. Of the total, 673 have recovered.

Bertie remains third among the ARHS service region, following the 858 cases in Pasquotank County (35 deaths) and 852 cases in neighboring Hertford County (35 deaths).

Those three counties are easily the highest number of cases in the


