POWELLSVILLE - A Friday afternoon shooting turned into a murder investigation over the weekend.

Crash claims 2 lives

MERRY HILL - Two Washington County men died in a two-vehicle accident here last Thursday (May 13).

First Sgt. L.M. Hill said the two men were traveling south on N.C. 45 at the same time a tractor carrying a disc was moving in the same direction. The driver of the car failed to reduce speed and collided with the disc being pulled by the tractor.

Both men in the car died as a result of injuries sustained in the crash. The driver was identified as 35-year-old James Jamaal Cameron of 34 Village Drive in Plymouth. The passenger was Ladarius Kendall Hunt, 28, of 1321 Mackey's Road in Plym-

First Sgt. Hill said excessive speed was a factor in the crash. No charges will be filed.

The driver of the tractor escaped without injury.

Both Windsor and Bertie County officials are happy to see N.C. Governor Roy Cooper lifting most restrictions which have been in place for the past year due to the worldwide pandemic of CO-

"Obviously, the governor

and our local county and town leaders had to do their best to follow the science," Windsor/Bertie Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Lewis Hoggard said. "Having said that, it is certainly good for everyone to see businesses back at full capacity and those with the vaccine able to shed their face coverings."

Last week, following the

recommendation of the Centers for Disease Control, Gov. Cooper lifted many of the remaining restrictions left in the state, including removing the mask mandates for most settings.

Truck strikes

WINDSOR - A pedestrian and two vehicles were involved in an automobile accident on Bull Hill Road near Windsor Monday morn-

N.C. Highway Patrol Trooper Z.B. Mize said a Toyota Tacoma was parked partially on Bull Hill Road when a F350 operated by Earl Dempsey of 416B N.C. 45 in Merry Hill failed to reduce speed and made contact with the Toyota.

"At that time, the Tacoma struck a pedestrian," the trooper said.

The pedestrian, identified as Donald Ray Hoggard of 916 Bull Hill Road in Windsor, was taken to Vidant Bertie Hospital where he was subsequently airlifted to Vidant Medical Center in Greenville. His condition was considered critical.

Dempsey was also transported to Vidant Bertie Hospital where
