Tapping into the current surge of visitors searching for untapped rural America destinations, the county is undertaking the project to develop new economic growth. According to Bertie County Project Facilitator Robin Payne, "A large percentage of rural counties, in stressed economic categories, have the most to offer in terms of 'assets'. Traditional forms of workplace are still industry and agriculture - but travel and tourism offers to diversify the economy because people can have cottage businesses etc. Bertie can do all of this and still retain their signature rural scenic feel.'
